A corrupt former Loudon County Deputy that was convicted a few years ago of stealing power in Blount County is now facing charges of burglary.

David Dewayne Drinnen formerly worked for the Loudon County Sheriff's Department and left his job with them.

According to statements from Blount County Sheriff James Berrong, the Blount County Sheriff's Office investigators charged Curtis Lynn Woody, 52, of Longhollow Road with burglary of a business and vandalism. He was also served with an outstanding warrant for forgery and three warrants for failure to appear in court on earlier charges.

Woody is being held without bond on the warrants, and bonds totaling \$10,000 on the new charges pending a hearing in Blount County General Sessions Court at 1:30 p.m. June 3.

David Dewayne Drinnen, also of Long Hollow Road, Maryville is charged with burglary of a business and vandalism. He was released Thursday on bonds totaling \$10,000 pending a hearing in Blount County General Sessions Court at 1:30 p.m. June 3.

They are charged with the burglary of the Walland Center on East Lamar Alexander Parkway in Walland, the Sheriff said. The front glass door of the business had been shattered and items were missing.

Both men were arrested at their residence on Long Hollow Road. Woody was taken into custody Tuesday, and Drinnen was arrested Thursday.

Investigators have continued to follow leads and were able to recover multiple stolen items in Woody's home and from a pond behind the residence belonging to

Knox County Public Library to open eight locations opened last Friday,

Knox County Public Library will open eight of its 19 locations beginning on Friday, May 29 as part of the Phase Two Reopening Plan put forth by the Knox County Health Department. Each of these locations will resume its regular schedule. The Libraries selected to reopen will provide access for patrons in all areas of the county. Next week, 102 employees will return to work with 67 remaining on furlough. Twenty-five employees remained active during closure.

Each Library has been fully sanitized and equipped with plexiglass sneeze shields at service counters. Available seating will be arranged to adhere to physical distancing guidelines. No public computers will be available, however, every location is equipped with WIFI. The Library will isolate all returned materials for 48 hours to ensure the safe handling of books, CDs, DVDs and other materials. Storytimes, other programs and meeting room use will be suspended until further notice.
