Statewide Unemployment Rate Pecreases for Second Consecutive Month in July

Tennessee's unemployment rate decreased in June for the second consecutive month after reaching an all-time high in April, according to preliminary data from the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

The June 2020 seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased to 9.7%, down 1.3 percentage points from May's revised rate of 11%.

One year ago, the rate was 3.4%, very near the state's alltime low unemployment rate of 3.3%.





George Boring, 30, Valleyview Drive Maryville, was charged with False Report.




in Georgetown, Kentucky. During which time it is believed that one male did exit the store and leave in the vehicle.

different cruise ships. During this time frame, 80 percent of ships were affected by COVID-19. As of July 3, nine of the 49 ships under the No Sail Order have ongoing or resolving outbreaks. According to U.S. Coast Guard data, as of July 10, 2020, there are 67 ships with 14,702 crew onboard.

This Order will remain in effect until the earliest of:

The expiration of the Secretary of Health and Human Services' declaration that COVID-19 constitutes a public health emergency,

The CDC Director rescinds or modifies the order based on specific public health or other considerations, or

September 30, 2020.

On cruise ships, passengers and crew share spaces that are more crowded than most urban settings. Even when only essential crew are on board, ongoing spread of COVID-19 still occurs. If unrestricted cruise ship passenger operations were permitted to resume, passengers and crew on board would be at increased risk of

COVID-19 infection and those that work or travel on cruise ships would place substantial unnecessary risk on healthcare workers, port personnel and federal partners (i.e., Customs and Border Protection and the U.S. Coast Guard), and the communities they return to.

Written comments can be submitted through the Federal Register notice, once published.





Tennessee experienced record-high unemployment in April when the jobless number spiked to 15.5% at the height of business closures due to the COVID-19 health emergency. Before the pandemic, the state's previous record-setting unemployment rate was 12.9% in January 1983.

Between May and June, the state's employers added 108,500 nonfarm jobs. The top three sectors for job creation across Tennessee were leisure/hospitality, government, and education and health services.

As the state slowly reopens, employers are creating new job opportunities, but there is still a deficit when comparing year-to-year data. From June 2019 through June 2020, Tennessee lost 154,000 positions. The largest decrease came in

the leisure/hospitality sector, followed by the manufacturing sector, and then the professional/business services sector.

Nationally, seasonally adjusted unemployment dropped by 2.2 percentage points in June, going from 13.3% to 11.1%.

The state will release unemployment data for each of Tennessee's 95 counties at 1:30 p.m. CT Thursday, July 23, 2020.


