



Additionally, Tennessee Promise students are accumulating more college credits, staying enrolled longer, and earning post-secondary credentials at higher rates than their peers. In fact, Promise recipients at community colleges are more than twice as likely to earn a credential when compared to other recent high school graduates.

Tennessee Promise provided college opportunities to 24 percent of all public high school graduates from 2015 to 2017. Although 49,500 became Promise students in those years, OREA's research found that graduates with


Evade

Justin Plummer, 23, E 9th Ave Lenoir City, was charged with Felony Evading Arrest, and Altercation of Engine or Serial Number. While on patrol Officer J. sion of TennCare for the period January 1, 2014, through June 30, 2019.

In a Statement from Russell Johnson, District Attorney General: After reviewing the Morgan County Medical Center (MCMC) investigative audit report released by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office, it did not appear that action by our office was necessary. MCMC did not have correct procedures in place to accurately report TennCare visits and over-reported approximately 6,900 visits that were in fact Medicare/Medicaid visits, thereby receiving over-payments of more than \$360,000.00. MCMC had a flawed system, but not such that we considered it an intentional situation arising to a criminal level. They also paid in too much as well on other cases which did offset some of the \$360,000. It seems as corrective measures are going to be put in place by the Morgan County Medical Center and they intend to repay the overpaid amounts received. Therefore, there will be no prosecution.


Aikens performed poorly on sobriety test and refused blood draw. Terri Aikens was placed under arrest.



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

low ACT scores, minority applicants, and those from low-income households were less likely to become Promise students.

Not all Promise students receive funding because Tennessee Promise is a last-dollar scholarship. About 60 percent of Promise funds went to students from households with annual incomes over \$80,000. Students from lower income households were more likely to qualify for the Pell grant or other need-based scholarships.

OREA also examined challenges that make it difficult to receive or maintain a Promise scholarship.

70 percent of Promise applicants did not become eligible for the program because they failed to meet requirements. The majority of those students missed either

the mandatory mentor meeting or failed to complete the required eight hours of community service. Evidence suggests some students would have gone to college as Promise students if missing these requirements had not made them ineligible.

Promise requirements can also become barriers to success once students enroll in college. Community college administrators say mandatory community service and fulltime enrollment requirements cause students to lose eligibility. These same requirements are not imposed on Tennessee Reconnect or HOPE scholarship students.

Tennessee Promise does not cover the costs of books, supplies, tools, or non-mandatory fees. It is estimated that community college Promise students pay an average of \$1,150 each year for these

items. 75 percent of community college administrators indicate these costs impeded academic success or persistence of Promise students.


