

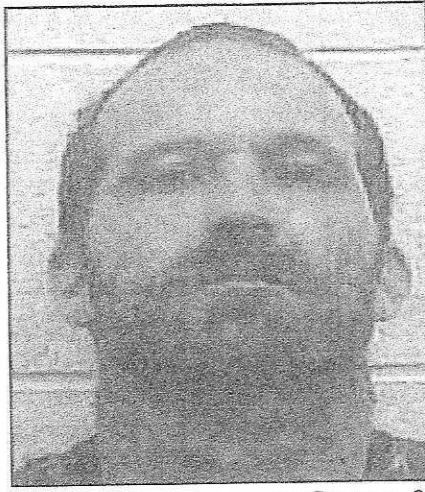

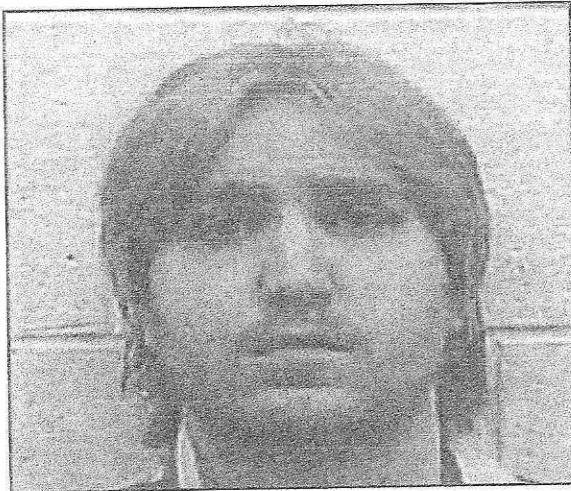

Two Men Charged in Connection with Events at U.S. Capitol

Two men were charged today in federal court in the District of Columbia in connection with the riots at the U.S. Capitol on Wednesday, Jan. 6, 2021.

Larry Rendell Brock, of Texas, was charged with one count of knowingly entering or remaining in any restricted building or grounds without law-

ful authority and one count of violent entry and disorderly conduct on Capitol grounds. Brock was arrested today in Texas.

It is alleged that Brock was identified as one of the individuals who unlawfully entered the U.S. Capitol wearing a green helmet, green tactical vest with patches, black and camo jacket, and

beige pants holding a white flex cuff, which is used by law enforcement to restrain and/or detain subjects.

Eric Gavelek Munchel, of Tennessee, was charged with one count of knowingly entering or remaining in any restricted

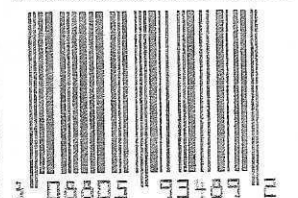
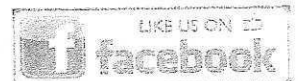

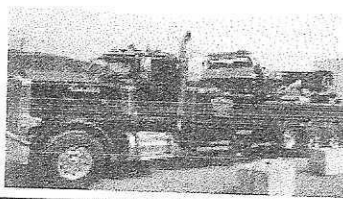

Timothy Cox, 54, Roosevelt Road Knoxville, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Possession of Meth, Simple Possession, and Poss. Of Drug Para.

Officer R. Miller LCPD, conducted a traffic stop on a black in color Cadillac sedan for a registration violation. The registration displayed on the Cadillac was 4S6-2Z5 which came back to a 1992 Brown Ford F-150 out of Chattanooga. Upon the traffic stop Officer and Officer Ketner made contact with two subjects inside of the vehicle, the driver later identified as a Ms. Kristi Higdon and the passenger who identified as Mr. Timothy Cox. Officer Ketner then had Higdon step out

of the vehicle to talk to her about the registration displayed on the vehicle. Officer Miller then had Cox step out to speak with me due to him being nervous/fidgety. When Cox stepped out of the vehicle a baggie of marijuana (3 Grams) was sitting in plain view where he was sitting. Cox was then detained and a search of his person revealed a (1) digital scale with residue, (1) Glass Meth Pipe, & \$1029 of US Currency. LCSO was on scene with a K-9 where it preformed an open air sniff of the vehicle and alerted to an odor of narcotics. A search of the vehicle was conducted and revealed (13 Grams) of a crystal like substance thought to

The Flock Camera System alerted Lenoir City Officers Jamie Ketner, that a stolen tag had entered the City. Officer stopped the vehicle with the Tennessee registration 8K77X4 on Highway 321/Tellico Exit. Officer identified the driver as Samuel Thomas Klimas. Dispatched confirmed that the tag was stolen out of Knox County, Tn. Mr. Klimas stated that he was starting a new job that required a license plate; so he stole one from the Target in Alcoa. Mr. Klimas was arrested. A vehicle inventory of his vehicle was conducted. One marijuana bong and forty-five (45) grams of marijuana glass/wax was located in his vehicle.

Capitol

building or grounds without lawful authority and one count of violent entry and disorderly conduct on Capitol grounds. Munchel was arrested today in Tennessee.

It is alleged that Munchel was inside of the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021. Photos depicting his presence show a person who appears to be Munchel carrying plastic restraints, an item in a holster on his right hip, and a cell phone mounted on his chest with the camera facing outward, ostensibly to record events that day.

These cases are being prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia and the Counterterrorism Section of the DOJ's National Security Division, with assistance from the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Texas and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Tennessee. The cases are being investigated by the FBI's Washing-

ton Field Office, the FBI's Dallas Field Office, the FBI's Memphis Field Office and the United States Capitol Police.

The information contained in the charging documents are merely allegations. The defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

The ATF and FBI continue to urge the public to report suspected use of explosive devices, or violent, destructive acts associated with the recent

unrest. Anyone with information can call 1-888-ATF-TIPS (1-888-283-8477), email ATFTips@atf.gov or submit information anonymously via ReportIt.com.

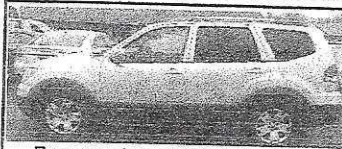

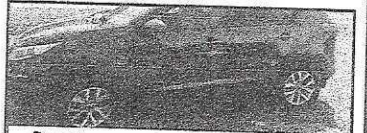

Ian Young, 43, Kenilworth Lane Knoxville, was charged with DUI, Leaving the Scene of Accident, Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. I, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Branson LCSO, was advised by dispatch that a silver Nissan Sentra had got off of I-75 and hit a guard rail. The vehicle continued and turned onto Sugar limb Road where Deputy observed it coming up to Highway 11 on Sugar limb Road. The vehicle had damage on the driver side that was consistent with hitting a guard rail.
