



the protected party in an order of protection against the offender prohibiting the offender from having contact with her.

Deputies performed a consent search of witness car and found 2.82 grams of a white crystalline substance believed to be Meth, a SCCY 380 handgun with ammo, two pipes with meth residue on them, a green marijuana pipe, and a marijuana grinder.

Mary Mincey stated that all those things were hers. Narcotic Deputy Stanley tru narced the substance which came back positive for meth. DCS referral 1340801025 was made. This did happen in Loudon County Tn.

Charges

William Dotson, 26, Hershey Drive Hamblen, was charged with Public Intoxication, Man/Sell/Poss. Of Controlled Substance, Poss. of Drug Para., and Contraband in a Penal Institution.

Corporal Z. Frye LCSO, observed a blue car traveling at a high rate of speed Southbound on I-75. Deputy paced the vehicle traveling at 93MPH in a 65MPH zone. Upon traffic stop Deputy made contact with the driver. She stated she was traveling to Morristown after delivering a DoorDash order in Lenoir City. The passenger was identified as William Dotson. The passenger seemed very hyperactive and had trouble answering questions. The passenger was removed from the vehicle and had difficulty obeying commands from officers. The passenger stated he had used

Methamphetamine earlier in the day. Consent to search the vehicle was given by the driver/owner. Located in the passenger door panel was 2 syringes, 5 small baggies with powder residue and a glass pipe.

The passenger claimed the paraphernalia. Due to William Dotson's actions and statements made about drug use, Deputy felt he was a danger to be left in public and arrested for Public Intoxication and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Once at the jail, corrections officers located 4.45 grams of a crystal substance, believed to be meth, on Dotson's person while being searched. He was then charged with Introduction of Contraband into a Penal Facility and Possession of Methamphetamine. The driver, was released with a verbal warning for speeding. This all did occur in Loudon County, TN.



The traffickers advertised online and also used an elaborate word-of-mouth network of customers to avoid law enforcement.

"Through further investigation, we discovered there was a much larger network involved, where girls and women would come in from overseas or from other states to be exploited," said FBI Washington Field Office Special Agent Jeremy Obie, who investigated this case as part of the task force. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security and various police departments from Maryland, Virginia, New York, New Jersey, and Washington, D.C., worked closely with the FBI on the investigation.

Victim statements, combined with search warrants electronic evidence,

helped bring down the ring of six traffickers. The additional four traffickers played other roles, such as leasing apartments used for trafficking, recruiting girls and women, transportation, security, and collecting money:

Both Rodriguez and Guzman-Beato were convicted of sex trafficking a minor and sentenced to 16 years in prison last July. The four others involved also received sentences ranging from 6 1/2 years to 15 1/2 years.

These types of cases require patient rapport-building with traumatized victims, as well as traditional investigative work such as search warrants, surveillance, data analysis, and coordination of multiple agencies.

"When you've met these victims and have seen what has happened to them, you don't want to let them down," Obie said. "We work day and night on these types of cases,





and we're very passionate about protecting those who cannot protect themselves: society's innocent—our children.

Although January is when the country marks National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, the FBI and our partners work to ferret out and arrest human traffickers every day. And while putting a stop to trafficking is key, the FBI also works to help victims get the services they need to recover.

And that's exactly what happened in the case of the missing Virginia girl. Victim specialists from multiple partner agencies offered the girl therapy and other services to help her recover and move forward in life. She's even chosen to remain in contact with the FBI, two years after she was rescued in January 2019.

"It's definitely rewarding to see a good outcome and that you've helped change the whole dynamic of a child's life. The victim sill contacts me to this day, keeping me updated on her life and how she's doing," Obie said. "She's back on her feet, and she is on her way to a new beginning with a more positive outlook toward life."


