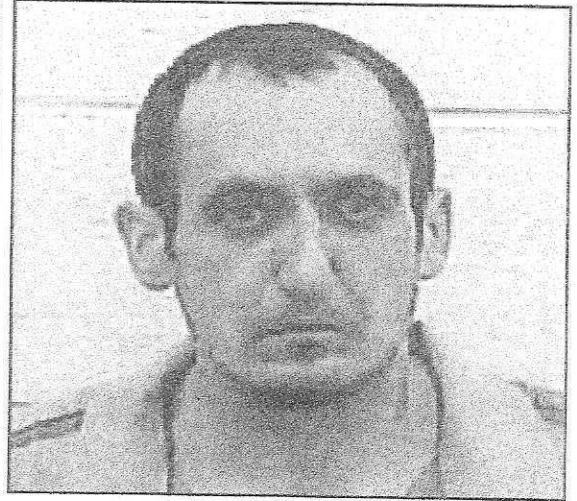
Amber Manis Enters Guilty Plea in 2018 Morgan County Vehicular Homicide Case

District Attorney General Russell Johnson announced that Amber Manis (37 YOF) entered a guilty plea today before Judge Jeff Wicks in Morgan County Criminal Court in a criminal case stemming from a vehicle crash on Airport Road in the afternoon of November 10, 2018. The wreck was a head on collision involving Manis as the driver and sole occupant of a Chrysler mini-van that swerved into the opposite lane where a Mazda Protégé was being driven by Joseph Jones (40 YOM) with his 11 year old niece as a passenger. Jones was killed instantly and the passenger

suffered non-life threatening injuries. Manis was taken by LifeStar to UT Hospital where she later recovered from her injuries. The Tennessee Highway Patrol Critical Incident Team responded to the scene at the request of the request of the THP troopers who initially were called to work the

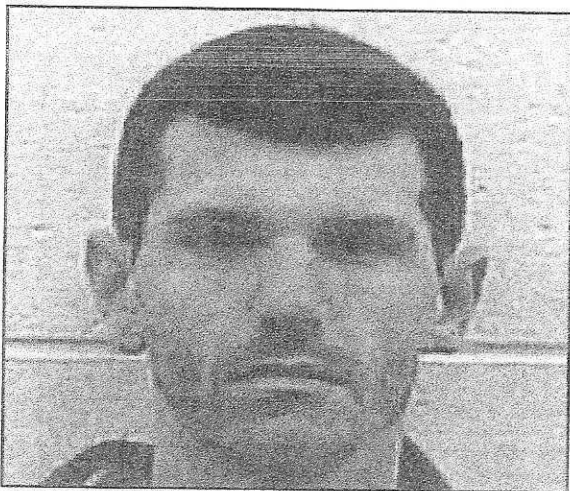

CDC estimates 1 in 5 people in the U.S. have a sexually transmitted infection

New data provide clearest picture to date of how costly and common STIs are in the U.S.

New data published by the CDC estimate that on any given day in 2018, 1 in 5 people in the U.S. had a sexually transmitted infection (STI). The analyses, published in the journal Sexually Transmitted Disease, show the burden of diagnosed and undiagnosed STIs in the U.S. and the estimated medical costs associated with STIs.

It is estimated there

were:

Nearly 68 million STIs on any given day in 2018 (prevalent STIs).

26 million newly acquired STIs in 2018 (incident STIs).

Nearly one in two incident STIs were acquired by people aged 15 to 24 years old.

Nearly \$16 billion in direct lifetime medical costs resulting from STIs acquired in 2018.

"The burden of STIs is staggering," said Jonathan Mermin, M.D., M.P.H., director of CDC's National Center for HIV/AIDS, Viral Hepatitis, STD, and TB Prevention. "At a time when STIs are at an all-time high, they have fallen out of the national conversation. Yet, STIs are a preventable and treatable national health threat with substantial personal and economic impact. There is an urgent need to see CDC pg. 4

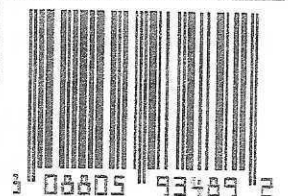

crash. A search warrant was obtained by THP for a blood draw on Manis to determine her blood-alcohol level and for the presence of prescription

or illegal drugs to further determine what other intoxicants might be in her system. The analysis of her blood at the TBI Forensics Lab determined manis to be negative for alcohol

and the drug toxicology determined that Ms. Manis had .05 ug/ml of methamphetamine, 253 ng/ml of diazepam, 92 ng/ml of nordiazepam, 11 ng/ml of temazepam, and 2 ng/ml of oxymorphone in her system. Manis was charged with vehicular homicide, felony reckless endangerment and driving on a suspended driver's license among other charges. After her charges were "bound over to the grand jury" in Morgan County General Sessions Court by Judge Mike Davis, the case was subsequently indicted by the Morgan County Grand Jury on September 16, 2019 and the matter moved on to the Morgan County Criminal Court. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, since March of 2020 most matters that are awaiting

trials by jury have been put on hold by order of the Tennessee Supreme Court. After much hard work on the part of DUI prosecutor, ADA Joe Caldwell, this case was brought to a successful conclusion today.

In a plea agreement hearing that took place via video link with the Morgan County Jail where Manis was in custody, Manis pled guilty to a Class B felony Vehicular Homicide by Intoxication and a Class E felony Reckless Endangerment with a Weapon (her vehicle) and received TDOC prison sentences of eight years and two years, respectively, to serve in prison on each charge. Even though her driver's license was already suspended before the tragedy that she brought about, by this conviction, her driver's license will be suspended an additional ten years and she

Tyler Anderson, 32, Hwy 30 E Athens, was charged with Theft of Property, and Evading Arrest.

Scott Brewster was dispatched to 911 Hwy 321 in Lenoir City, TN regarding shoplifting. The suspect left in a red four door Dodge truck on Hwy 321 towards the interstate. gent need to reverse the trend of increasing STIs, especially in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, which has affected many STI prevention services.”

STIs can have serious health consequences. People with these infections do not always experience disease symptoms, but, if left untreated, some STIs can increase the risk of HIV infection, or can cause chronic pelvic pain, pelvic inflammatory disease, infertility, and/or severe pregnancy and newborn complications.

HIV and HPV infections acquired in 2018 were the costliest STIs in the new CDC analysis, as medical costs for these infections include lifetime treatment for people with HIV and treatment for HPV-related cancers. Other reportable STIs, including chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis, have substantial medical costs as well.

Of the estimated \$16 billion in lifetime medical costs from STIs acquired in 2018:

Most (\$13.7 billion) of all costs were attributed to sexually acquired HIV infections.

\$755 million were attributed to HPV infections.

More than \$1 billion were attributed to chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis combined.

About 60% of these combined costs from chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis were among young people ages 15-24 yrs.

Nearly 75% of the \$2.2 billion in non-HIV-related STI medical costs were among women.

The total cost of STIs far exceeds the medical cost burden estimated in this study, which did not include costs associated with lost productivity, other non-medical costs, and STI prevention.

“Proven STI prevention – at all levels – is a cornerstone of protecting America’s health, economic security, and wellness,” said Raul Romaguera, acting director for CDC’s Division of STD Prevention. “There are significant human and financial costs associated with these infections, and we know from other studies that cuts in STI prevention efforts result in higher costs down the road. Preventing STIs could save billions in medical costs, but more importantly, prevention would improve the health

and lives of millions of people.”

Focusing STI prevention on those hardest hit and the need for better data

COVID-19 has underscored the underlying effects of systemic health and social inequities that put racial and ethnic minority groups and other populations at increased risk of infection. Similarly, there is an ongoing disproportionate burden of STIs among certain racial and ethnic groups; among young people between 15 and 24 years old who accounted for nearly half of all new STIs in 2018; and among women, who account for a disproportionate burden of severe STI outcomes and medical costs.

CDC’s new estimates are critical to better understanding the scope of STIs in the U.S. However, the findings also highlight gaps in the scientific literature and the ongoing need for more data. This includes the need for population-based STI screening estimates to provide a better picture of diagnosed and undiagnosed STIs in groups disproportionately affected, including some racial/ethnic minority groups and people who are lesbi-

an, gay, bisexual, transgender, or and queer/questioning LGBTQ.

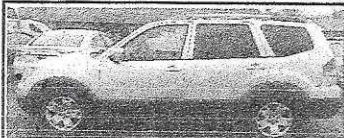
Innovative strategies critical to addressing the STI epidemic

At a time when the COVID-19 pandemic is exacerbating racial and ethnic health disparities, straining the public health infrastructure, and creating additional challenges to delivering health-care services, new strategies for increasing access to quality sexual healthcare are critical. Strategies used to overcome barriers associated with the COVID-19 pandemic have the potential to help reverse increases in STIs. Examples include:

STI express clinics that allow walk-in STI testing and treatment without a full clinical exam.

Partnerships with pharmacies and retail health clinics, which can provide new access points for STI services, such as on-site testing and treatment.

Telehealth/telemedicine, which can ensure access to healthcare providers, support self-testing or self-collection, and is especially critical in rural areas.



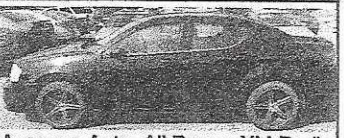
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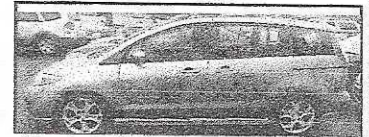


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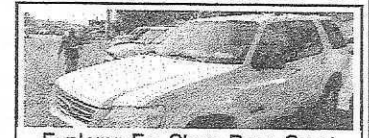
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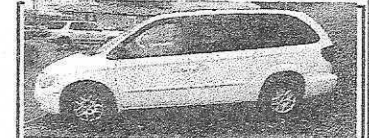

David Joseph, 35, Perkey Lane Loudon, was charged with Simple Possession x2, and Mfg/Del/Sale or Possession of Meth.

Margaret Helms, 32, Perkey Lane Loudon, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, and Display of Registration Plate.

Dep. L. Hawkins LCSO, observed a 2001 Maroon Dodge Caravan on Highway 321 at the intersection of Highway 70 West with no registration displayed. Deputy conducted a traffic stop on Highway 70 West at Highway 321 and made contact with the driver, Margaret Helms, and the passenger, David Joseph. She advised me she knew the tag was removed and was going to get a new one on Monday.

Deputy then asked Mrs.

Helms if there was anything illegal in the vehicle and she advised there was a needle in her purse that she uses to shoot Methamphetamine and Mr. Joseph advised there was Suboxone in the floorboard.

Deputy then searched the vehicle, in Mrs. Helms' purse a baggie of clear crystal-like substance weighing 1.52g was found, she advised it was Methamphetamine and took ownership of it. In the floorboard in between the front seats, another small baggie with a clear crystal-like substance weighing 1.07g was found along with one dosage unit of Suboxone inside tinfoil. Mr. Joseph advised the baggie found in the car was Methamphetamine, and the substance in the tinfoil was Suboxone, he did take ownership of both.

While searching a black


back-pack belonging to Mr. Joseph, a baggie was found with a blue partial pill/powder substance, he advised he did not know what it was.

Marty Stanley 908 conducted TruNarc tests on both clear crystal-like substances and the blue partial pill/powder substance. Both

clear crystal-like substances tested positive for Methamphetamine and the blue partial pill/powder substance tested for Fentanyl.

Both subjects were taken into custody and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

This did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.



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

will have to re-apply to try and get it reinstated.

The step-father of Joseph Jones, Mr. Sylvester Smith of Rocky Top, Tennessee, was also able to testify and explain to the Court what effect the tragic death of Jones has had on him and the rest of his family, including the traumatic impact to Jones' niece, who was also a victim of Manis' selfish and thoughtless action of driving while intoxicated. Sylvester Smith said in his testimony that, "It's been hard every day. Instead of going with him to a car show, I had to plan a funeral. He didn't have to die. If she wanted to do drugs, she could have just stayed at home!"

General Johnson commended ADA Caldwell and the DUI Unit Coordinator Holly Miller on, once again, bringing about justice and providing at least some level of comfort and closure to family who tragically lost a loved one who can never be replaced. Generals Caldwell and Johnson both thanked the THP for their work on the scene and their persistence in following through with the work after the fact on the search warrant, at the hospital, at the forensic lab and for the CIRT analysis that gave their office everything that was needed to bring this case to conclusion.

These individuals were: Lt. Carey Hixson, CIRT Trooper Chris Best, and Troopers Matthew Vespie, Josh Thorne and Nathan Crow along with members of the Morgan County Sheriff's Office.



advised her there was not a train crossing where we were at, she stated she saw the caution lights on the sign off the roadway. There was a caution sign with yellow

lights flashing where she was stopped, it is a red light warning for the intersection approximately 1/4 mile ahead and was visible from that location. Deputy noticed Mrs. Brown had glossy/bloodshot eyes, slurred speech, smelled of an alcoholic beverage, and could not hold the ongoing conversation, talking out of her head. Mrs. Brown advised me she had just left Walmart but had one beer at a Mexican restaurant in Vonore, and what was left of that beer was in a Styrofoam cup in the center console. She was asked to exit the vehicle and did not cooperate, she was asked several more times and did exit without incident. Mrs. Brown consented to S.F.S.T. and Deputy conducted H.G.N. and found six clues. Once Deputy instructed the Walk and Turn test,

she refused to continue due to the footwear she had on. Based on Deputy training and experience he believed Mayglenn Brown to be under the influence of alcohol, she had put herself and the public in danger by stopping her vehicle in the roadway. More so this evening due to the heavy fog in the area and the darkness of the roadway. She was taken into custody and transported to the Fort Loudoun Medical Center for a blood draw she consented to, then was transported the Loudon County Jail.
