

Reporting Suspicious Activity

Comptroller's Office Studies Per Pupil Expenditures for K12 Public Schools

The Tennessee Comptroller's Office of Research and Education Accountability (OREA) has released a suite of publications examining new data released by the Department of Education (TDOE) that presents per pupil expenditures for every K-12 public school in the state for the 2018-19 school year. A provision in the federal education

law, the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) passed into law in 2015, requires that the annual State Report Card for public schools include a per pupil expenditure amount for each school. Previously, most states had reported per pupil expenditures only by district.

To provide some context to the amount

of per pupil spending for each school, OREA has released an interactive dashboard of per pupil spending and demographic data for all K-12 public schools and districts. An interactive map allows users to view a breakdown of 2018-19 average district level expenditures.






Post 256, 2nd Vice Commander Philip Boruszewski served with the Coast Guard and was stationed in Memphis, TN. His career with the Coast Guard gave him an extensive knowledge of the Mississippi River; then later in his dedicated career he segued into the Coast Guard's Homeland Security program where he specializing in the subject, "Suspicious Activity Reporting". Speaking to fellow American Legion members Mr. Boruszewski gave a detailed briefing of the upper & lower Mississippi River jurisdictions which includes 652 navigational miles with multiple locks and dams. On the subject of Suspicious Activity Reporting he explained to his fellow Legionnaires that with hostilities all around us today it's extremely important to stay on your guard, be alert and relay any information that could be important to authorities. He gave the group examples of suspicious activities and many links of phone numbers, web-

sites and one notable reporting method is Tennessee's Mobile App: SafeTN. With SafeTN, you can anonymously report suspicious or criminal behavior and other safety concerns. You can do this by reporting observed threats, behaviors, or actions. Here is an example of some of the common behaviors and incidents to report: assault, sexual misconduct, bragging about an upcoming planned attack, threats of violence or planned violence, physical injury or harm to self or others. This mobile application is a secure, open door communication platform where citizens can send in tips and access useful resources to help keep their schools and community safe. This free mobile application can be downloaded from the Apple Store and Google Play.



Schools

A legislative brief describes TDOE's methodology in calculating the per pupil figures at both the school and district level. It also explains briefly how school districts are funded in Tennessee and how, in turn, school districts allocate funds to their schools.

The report examines Tennessee's data and discusses factors that are important for the General Assembly and other education stakeholders to consider regarding the per pupil figures, particularly when comparing schools. The data is not intended to distinguish specific expenditures (e.g., how much each school spent on salaries and benefits and whether the school employs a larger proportion of newer teachers with lower salaries or more experienced teachers with higher salaries). Private donations that schools

receive are not included in the data.

It is not advisable to isolate a single factor – such as the grade level, or the percent of economically disadvantaged students or English learners at a school – as the reason a school spent more per pupil compared to other schools. For this reason, the report also discusses other data considerations to keep in mind when reviewing the data, such as the cost of educating students at special population schools, enrollment and grade span, student demographics (e.g., economically disadvantaged and English learner students), and building costs and utilities.

Comptroller's Office Examines Successes and Challenges of Tennessee Promise

The Tennessee Comptroller's Office has released a new update in its ongoing evaluation of the Tennessee Promise Scholarship Program.

The update shows more students are attending college after graduating from high school following the implementation of Tennessee Promise. Tennessee's college-going rate increased from 58.64 percent to 64.4 percent in the first year of the program.

The program has also helped more students stay enrolled in college and on track to earning a credential, especially for the first group of program participants. The increased enrollment and retention of these students will likely result in a higher

attainment rate for Tennessee in 2021 and 2022, as the first group of Promise students are included in the state's attainment rate. The attainment rate measures the percentage of students who earn a post-secondary credential.

The increase in Tennessee's attainment rate attributable to Tennessee Promise students is likely to slow after 2022, however. Comptroller researchers point out that the college-going rate did not continue to rise after the initial implementation of Tennessee Promise. Four years after the program's implementation, the college-going rate had declined from 64.4 percent to 61.8 percent. In addition, the most recent data available shows fewer students remain on track to graduate compared to the first group of program participants. **Promise ctd. pg. 5**





Deputy Rogers LCSO, observed a vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed on I75 Southbound. Deputy RADAR unit confirmed the vehicle was traveling 96mph in a 70mph zone. Meeting Tennessee's Drive to 55 goal will likely not be possible without increasing the number of students who enter and remain in the program. Tennessee Promise is part of the state's Drive to 55 initiative to increase the percentage of Tennesseans with a postsecondary credential to 55 percent by 2025.

The Comptroller's Office has developed several policy options for the General Assembly to consider relative to the decrease in enrollment and retention since the start of the program. These include possible changes to the program's community service or full-time enrollment requirement, as well as extending program funding to cover books and fees for students who meet certain criteria. The policy options can be found in the extensive evaluation of the program published in July 2020.






