

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) plans to provide \$300 million to jurisdictions for community health worker (CHW) services to support Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) prevention and control, and additional \$32 million for training, technical assistance, evaluation. and

Deputy Billy Lewis LCSO, responded to Church Street for vandalism to a vehicle and theft of keys. While enroute Deputy was advised that a pit bull was walking down church street bleeding from its left side. upon arrival Deputy observed the Pitbull which Deputy identified as belonging to Gordon Narmore to have a puncture wound to its left rib area. Animal control was dispatched was dispatched to take possession of the dog. Deputy then spoke to the Aunt who stated that Gordon had taken her car keys to her 1998 red Honda Sunday and refused to give them back. Aunt stated that when she asked Gordon for the keys he exploded on her revving the car

up turning it off and leaving the scene with the keys. Gordon returned and when aunt confronted him about the damage to her car he started yelling and left again walking down the rail road tracks. The aunt advised that Gordon had ripped the passenger side mirror off, kicked dents in both front and rear car doors of both sides.

Deputy observed the vehicle to have extensive damage to all four doors, and was able to see several fresh foot prints on the vehicles paint. Gordon was later located walking along the train tracks next to Spring Street and was transported to the Loudon County Jail by Cpl. B. Smith without incident.

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

At that time, Noah entered into the bedroom and got in my face like a drill seargeant; saying I was talking bad to his son and just screaming so I started screaming back. (The phone was in my hand from the time I walked into the bedroom). As we were velling at each other I thought Noah just trying to make me mad, so I said in a nice voice "I know what you are doing trying to upset me." Then I smiled and said "it's funny I recorded you." "I did not record anyone or was going to I only said that to get him to calm down".

Instead, he said give me that phone, the phone had been in my hand the whole time. He then grabbed onto my cell phone, I then locked by left hand to my righthand and pulled down, at which time sat on the bed. Noah was holding the phone tryingto pull my hand off the phone. This was the only contact he made with my body was pulling at the phone. I then slid down to the floor pulling on my knees and was pulling back, I did not let go of my phone. I was then pulled around the end of the bed, to bottom which I got turned by pulling the phone and the phone came up to the left side of my neck (making a redness). I did say stop you are hurting me twice, while both of us were pulling at the phone. I was pulled down because I did not let go of my phone. I

could have let go at any time but did not for awhile.


Only contact with Noah was the pulling the phone with my hands. Noah did not say he wanted or dreamed he killed me on March 16 2021. Noah had a few weeks back was fussing about the way he grew up and said he thought as a child, of killing. Was never said on March 16, 2021 nor talk of fighting police.

I was asked to sign a warrant, order of protection and a custody order on the kids. I told the officer NO to all. I was asked to go to a shelter, I said NO.

I am NOT Afraid of my son, I love him and understand he needs anger management. I also told the officer the kids are being taken care of and have a good mother. I am in no way having hard feelings on this misunderstanding of the report, how it got incorrect. I need to add I have two land line phones, and 2 cell phones. Noah laid the phone down as soon as I let go it was turned off from the struggle of pulling it.

I also need to add, I have neck implants from surgery a few years ago new bone spurs and bone disease/arthritis on my neck. If I had been injured I'd be in the hospital or surgery. Noah NEVER put his hands around my neck and choked me. I'm 60 vears old. I would have had bruises and been hospitalized. I only want help with his anger issues. I would like to thank The Daily Edition for letting me tell my side of the story as to what happened on March 16, 2021.


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
