

Daniel Carver, 40, Circle Drive Loudon, was charged with Driving on Revoked Suspended License.

Deputy Green LCSO, observed a white Lexus traveling south on Hwy 11. Deputy recognized the driver to be Daniel Carver. Using prior knowledge that Mr. Carver's driver's license was revoked, Deputy conducted a traffic stop at Brentwood

Ms. Devaney was taken into custody for Simple Possession of Schedule 4 and Unlawful Drug Paraphernalia. Mr. Carver was taken into custody for driving on a revoked driver's license due to his extensive driv-

ing on revoked history. Both subjects were transported to Loudon County Jail without incident. All the above did occur in Loudon County, TN.

Robert Lambert, 33, Washington Ave Athens, was charged with Contraband in a Penal Institution, Poss. Of Drug Para., Driving on Revoked/Suspended License, Financial Responsibilty Law, and Simple Possession.

Deputy Rogers LCSO, observed a vehicle moving at a very slow speed on Steekee Rd in the area of Corinth Church Rd. While observing the vehicle Deputy made note that the vehicle swerved over the center line multiple times and did not have a light illuminating the registration. Deputy initiated a traffic stop in the area of Steekee School Rd and made contact with the driver offender Mr. Robert Lambert 5th who admitted he was swerving and stated he did not have a valid license. Loudon Co.

E911 confirmed his license to be Revoked for DUI and a Full Extradition, Warrant for Dangerous Drugs out of St. Tammany Parish, LA. While speaking to the offender Deputy smelled an odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle

Mr. Lambert did also give consent to search the vehicle at which time Deputy did recover a marijuana bowl, multiple baggies with marijuana 'shake' and observed the drug throughout the floorboard of the vehicle. 

be traced to him and took pains to avoid being seen.

"He was the most careful serial bomber anyone had ever seen," said Special Agent Kathleen Puckett, who worked on the UNABOM task force and led efforts to profile the bomber. (Both Puckett and Turchie are now retired from the FBI.)

But when the bomber began communicating, first in letters to some of his victims and then with the media, Turchie said he was also inadvertently communicating with the FBI. Investigators were analyzing his every word.

"We didn't have any line to him except the letters he started sending in 1993," said Puckett. "It was a bonanza of information." The letters pointed investigators to ideas he held, topics he studied, and books that were meaningful to him. To Puckett, who was working toward her Ph.D. in

clinical psychology, they revealed things about his education, age, and personality.

After lethal bombings in 1994 and 1995, the Unabomber wrote to several publications asking them to publish an essay that he believed would memorialize his achievements and his ideology. Although the bomber promised to cease his bombs if his writings were published, FBI leaders pushed for publication with a different goal in mind: using the Unabomber's own words to identify him.

"Somebody would recognize this," Turchie said of the decision. "The writings were very passionate—that there's no question this man really believes in what he's writing here. So he probably held these beliefs his entire life."

Theodore "Ted" Kaczynski terrorized the nation for nearly 20 years, planting bombs that killed three Americans and injured many more before his capture in 1996.

Puckett pointed to very particular spellings phrases—such as the British spelling of the word "analvse"—as unique identifiers in the text that she hoped would catch someone's eye.

Sure enough, a few months after the manifesto was published, a lawyer representing David Kaczynski called the FBI. He provided them with a 23-page essay his client's brother, Theodore Kaczynski, wrote in 1971. The agent who first read it immediately spotted similarities.


Turchie said that when he got a copy of the essay, the phrase "sphere of human freedom" jumped out at him. He said he went back to the Unabomber's manifesto and found this line:

"We are going to argue him.

> The similarities in the texts along with other evidence that came to light as agents investigated more of Kaczynski's past and records made Turchie more and more certain that they had their man. "The little things started adding up," he said. "Several of us believed we had identified the Unabomber."

> That was enough to get a search warrant for the rustic cabin in Montana where Kaczynski lived. Among the evidence found in the cabin were thousands of pages of Kaczynski's handwritten notes, including confessions to all 16 bombings. His words helped agents find him, and they helped prosecutors build the case against

"With millions of Americans getting vaccinated every day, it is important to update the public on the latest science about what fully vaccinated people can do safely, now including guidance on safe travel," said CDC Director Dr. Rochelle Walensky. "We continue to encourage every American to get vaccinated as soon as it's their turn, so we can begin to safely take steps back to our everyday lives. Vaccines can help us return to the things we love about life, so we encourage every American to get vaccinated as soon as they have the opportunity."

Because of the potential introduction and spread of new SARS-CoV-2 variants, differences in disease burden and vaccines, and vaccine coverage around the world, CDC is providing the following guidance related to international travel:

Fully vaccinated people can travel internationally without getting a COVID-19 test before travel unless it is required by the international destination.

Fully vaccinated people do not need to self-quarantine after returning to the United States, unless required by a state or local jurisdiction.

Fully vaccinated people

must still have a negative COVID-19 test result before they board, a flight to the United States and get a COVID-19 test 3 to 5 days after returning from international travel.

Fully vaccinated people should continue to take COVID-19 precautions while traveling internationally.

The guidance issued today does not change the agency's existing guidance for people who are not fully vaccinated. Unvaccinated travelers should still get tested 1-3 days before domestic travel and again 3-5 days after travel. They should stay home and self-quarantine for 7 days after travel or 10 days if they don't get tested at the conclusion of travel. CDC discourages non-essential domestic travel by those who are not fully vaccinated.
