



Wreck

The crash occurred about 12:30 p.m. near mile marker 72.

The Tennessee Highway Patrol said six people are in the hospital after a three-vehicle crash involving a semi-truck that shut down Interstate 75 in Loudon County Tuesday afternoon.

According to THP, a tractor-trailer, SUV and minivan crashed on Northbound I-75 at mile marker 72 north of the Pond Creek Road exit and south of the Loudon Highway exit around 12:30 p.m. Tues-

day.

Eight people total were in the three vehicles. THP said six people were taken to area hospitals: two by UT Medical Center Lifestar helicopters, two by ambulance, and two by private vehicles.

THP said it cannot provide details about the status of their injuries yet.

According to troopers, the crash happened after traffic had slowed down in both lanes of I-75 Northbound. THP said the semi-truck rear-ended the SUV in the righthand lane, and the SUV then crashed into the minivan.

The minivan then went off the road to the right before coming to a stop in a median, and the SUV went into an uncontrolled spin before stopped in the middle of both lanes. The semi-truck went off the road into the median.

Work to clear the crash scene took hours before all lanes were reopened around 6:45 p.m.

Gun

Steven Kelley, 69, Beals Chapel Road Lenoir City, was chargd with Aggravated Assault x3, and Reckless Endangerment.

Deputy Stanley 921, responded to Beals Chapel Road in regards to an Armed Person. While en route Deputy was informed by dispatch that subjects on scene were struggling with another male who had a gun. Upon arrival, Deputy observed multiple people in the roadway arguing. At that time Deputy Bengel secured a firearm from one of the bystanders on scene.

Deputy made contact with a male subject, identified as Steve Kelley. Kelley was detained because he was the male subject who had the firearm originally. Mr. Kelley advised that an altercation started between his neighbor, and two other male subjects on scene. Kelley advised he went outside and called his neighbor/victim to walk over to his property to confront him over an ongoing issue with him. Kelley advised at that time two other male subjects who were with victim started walking towards his property as well. Kelley advised a verbal altercation started with the subjects, and when victim started getting in his face and started to cuss him he hit him. Kelley advised at that time, he was pushed and felt in fear for his safety. Kelley advised he then pulled his firearm out of his pocket and fired two warning shots. Kelley advised he discharged one round into the air, and the other into the ground. Kelley then advised the three subjects then took him to the ground while hitting him in the face and tried to get his firearm.

After talking with Kelley about the incident, Deputy then made contact with victim, and the other two subjects involved. The other two subjects were identified. Victim 2 advised that Kelley called for victim and him to come over to

his yard so he could talk with them. He advised that him, victim and victim3 were at the road when the verbal altercation ensued, and then Kelly struck victim. The three advised at that time, Kelley then pulled his firearm and pointed it at victim 1 &2, before firing a warning shot. The three advised they were in fear for their lives and attempted to get the weapon from Kelley. Victim 2 advised that the slide of the firearm scrapped his hand during the struggle to obtain it, and that it was possible that the gun was discharged the second time while they were trying to subdue Kelley.

Deputies were advised on scene by victims that they did not wish to press charges on Kelly for Aggravated Assault. Both parties had been separated after the incident, and no one wished to seek medical treatment.

Kelley's firearm that was used in the incident (Ruger LCP .380) was taken from the scene and turned into the Loudon County Sheriff's Office for safekeeping.

Charges were later filed.

could not locate his personal phone, and a phone matching the description he gave was located on the suspect. She agreed that it was not hers, and the phone was returned to the victims. When asked about the argument, Alexandra stated that she kept hearing her parents talking about her when she wasn't in the room, and the frequent arguments made her upset. A written statement was taken from victim 1 and EMS evaluated all three involved and all statements were recorded on body cam. Deputy then placed Alexandra under arrest for misdemeanor domestic assault and transported her to the Loudon County Jail without incident. This did occur in Loudon County,


