

made numerous false statements and submitted fictitious documents to the state in order the obtain the grant. These included:

Stating an established textile manufacturer in Pakistan was the parent corporation of TCA when, in reality, the manufacturer had no business relationship with TCA.

Stating that TCA and the Pakistani manufacturer had 3,480 employees worldwide when, in reality, TCA had no employees.

Submitting a copy of the 2016 audit report for the Pakistani company as evidence that TCA had adequate funds to invest in the \$27.1 million dollar project in Pikeville. Again, TCA had no business relationship with this company.

Stating that TCA would hire 995 people. Karim Sadruddin admitted he knew TCA would never hire that many people, and he inflated the number of jobs in hopes of receiving more grant money.

Once the grant was awarded, TCA created and submitted fake

invoices, wire transfer documents, and other information indicating that work was being done and contractors were being paid in order to receive grant reimbursement payments from the state. ECD relied on these fraudulent documents when it disbursed the grant money.

As of January 2019, TCA had completed a minor portion of the building retrofit and only 10 sewing machines had been temporarily installed. No manufacturing jobs had been created.

Investigators determined the Sadruddins used some of the grant money they received to invest in an unrelated business venture, make a campaign contribution, purchase a \$54,500 Ford pickup, make payments on a residential building lot, and buy groceries.

Karim and Rahim Sadruddin have both pled guilty to multiple charges in state and federal court. Additionally, the Sadruddins have been ordered to pay restitution in the total amount of \$7,005,895.76. The details of their guilty pleas, restitution, and sentencing are outlined in the investigative report.





Jamie Word, 43, Sycamore AZ, was charged with Theft of Property.

Deputy Stanley LCSO, was informed of a stolen vehicle traveling Northbound on 175. Deputy was informed that the vehicle in question (White Ford E250 Work Van) was stolen from the Marathon on Pond Creek Road in Philadelphia just moments before the call originally came out. Loudon County Dispatch was relaying the vehicle's location in real time via a GPS tracker installed by the vehicle's owner (Bama Air Systems). A Statement was gathered by Deputy Brannum at the Marathon where the theft occurred, from the owner's emplovee. Owner stated that he ran inside the gas station to grab food and use the bathroom. He then stated the keys were inside the van, and when he came out the van was gone.


