



### Former Gibson County PTO President **Indicted for Theft**

Kacey Criswell led PTO at Spring Hill School

An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has led to the indictment of Kacey Criswell, the former PTO president and treasurer at Spring Hill School part of the Gibson County Special School District.

Investigators determined that Criswell misappropriated least \$17,586.08 from the PTO between July 2015 and November 2019. The investigation began after school officials reported missing PTO funds.

Much of the money was stolen when Criswell failed to deposit money that was received from fundraisers and basketball concessions. Criswell also wrote checks payable to cash to be used as change funds for did not deposit some of the change funds back into the bank ac-

#### Meth

William Keller, 25, Reed Spring Road Sweetwater, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, Poss. Of Drug Para., and Driving Unregistered Vehicle.

Deputy L. Hawkins LCSO, was traveling north on Dry Valley Road. Deputy noticed a vehicle ahead of him traveling the same direction. Deputy gave the Tennessee registration 9S8-9A6 to the Loudon County Dispatch to check for warrants or any NCIC entries. They advised him it came back to a 2001 Nissan Sentra registered to a Thompson out of Madisonville and that the registration was suspended. Deputy then conducted a traffic stop on Dry Valley Road at Dry Ridge Road. Deputy made contact with the driver, William Keller, and the passenger. Mr. Keller advised Deputy he was not aware that the registration was suspended, and that

the vehicle was loaned to him by Thompson within the last week. Mr. Keller was extremely nervous and kept looking downward. Deputy asked him to step out and speak with him, Deputy asked him if there was anything illegal in the vehicle and he replied, "Not that I know of." Dep. Jenkins asked passenger the same question. She stated there was a methamphetamine pipe in the vehicle, on the passenger side of the car. Deputy then asked her if there was any methamphetamine in the car, she replied "Look for the medicine capsule." Deputy conducted a probable cause search on the vehicle and recovered a blue glass pipe with crystal like residue inside it next to the passenger seat. Also next to the passenger seat, a purple capsule was found. Inside it was 1.2g of a clear/crystal like substance in a small baggie that appeared to be methamphetamine. Both

subjects were advised of their Miranda rights and asked what it was, and who it belonged to. Passenger advised it was methamphetamine and Mr. Keller's. When Deputy activated his emergency lights he threw the capsule and the pipe next to her seat to hide it. Deputy asked him and he did confirm this, he advised it was in his pocket and he placed it next to the seat to hide it. He was taken into custody. The Loudon County Narcotics Unit was advised of this incident.

#### **Imprisoned**

Joshua Bradley, 25, Grimes Road Loudon, was charged with False Imprisonment.

Deputy Rodriguez LCSO, responded to Grimes Road in regards to a domestic disturbance between spouses. Upon arrival, Deputy spoke Victim/Complainant, who advised him Joshua Bradley, Arrestee, has been drinking alcohol and took her keys when she wanted to leave the residence. She advised it was her only means of travel and when I asked Mr. Bradley if he knew where they were at he advised he did not. When told to find the keys multiple times, Mr. Bradley finally went straight to where the keys were placed which was at the neighbors backyard. Due to the circumstances of Mr. Bradley keeping Ms. Bradley from leaving and the history with law enforcement

between the two, Deputy placed Mr. Bradley in custody for false imprisonment. This occurred in Loudon County, TN.

Federal Jury Convicts Massachusetts Man On Five Counts Of Child Exploitation Related Offenses

Following a four-day trial in United States District Court at Greeneville, a jury convicted Nicholas Nassif Hayek, 22, of Leominster, Massachusetts, of knowingly or attempting to knowingly entice a minor to engage in sexual activity, knowingly or attempting to knowingly persuade a minor to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing any visual depiction of such conduct, knowingly transferring obscene matter to another individual who had not attained the age of 16 years, knowingly receiving child pornography and knowingly possessing child pomography involving a child less than 12 years of age.

Sentencing is set for November 29, 2021, at 1:30 p.m., before the Honorable Ronnie Greer, in United States District Court for the Eastern District of Tennessee at Greeneville. Hayek faces a maximum life sentence in prison and a 10-year minimum mandatory and a 15-year minimum mandatory for count one and two, respectively, for enticing a

evidence presented The at trial demonstrated that Havek found a 10-year-old child via social media. Havek

befriended the child and at trial the jury saw numerous chat messages exchanged between the two. The messages also detailed the countless requests from Hayek asking the child to send him nude photos. Law enforcement also obtained 22 pictures and one video of Hayek exposing himself to the child.

Acting U.S. Attorney Francis M. Hamilton, III of the Eastern District of Tennessee, made the announcement.



would receive bank statements. She also altered PTO financial reports to indicate the PTO's money was being deposited.

Criswell did pay back \$14,144.01 to the PTO; however, she still owes the PTO \$3,442.07. The PTO was formally dissolved in August 2020.

In July 2021, Kacey Criswell was indicted by the Gibson County Grand Jury on one count of theft over \$10,000.

In addition to the misappropriation, investigators are also questioning \$5,092.64 that was used for purchases that were unsupported by itemized receipts or other supporting documentation. Investigators could not determine if the purchases were used exclusively for the PTO's benefit.

"School support organizations must ensure they are

watching the money," said Comptroller Jason Mumpower. "It's important to keep invoices or receipts for every transaction, require two signatures on checks, and ensure two responsible individuals are signing off on any money collected during fundraising activities.




