





Fernando Gonzalez Guzman. 29, West Broadway Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, Violation of Implied Consent, and Open Container.

Officer Law LCPD, was on routine patrol when Officer observed a Blue GMC Yukon (TN Tag 397-BBFM) failing to maintain its lane of travel "Warning". Upon conducting a traffic stop at Hwy 321 (O'Reilly's) Officer could smell the strong odor of an alcoholic beverage omitting from the driver, Officer then had the driver step out of the vehicle.

When Officer had the driver exited the vehicle, he observed an open 12-ounce Bud Light can in the driver's side door, while speaking to the male Officer identified him to be Fernando Gonzalez Guzman. While speaking to Mr. Guzman Officer observed him to have blood shot watery eyes, and the odor of an alcoholic beverage omitting from his persons. Mr. Guzman stated he had two beers prior to our encounter. Mr. Guzman then consented to SFST; Lieutenant Dragon was requested

at the scene for assistance. Mr. Guzman did perform poorly on SFST, due to the totality of circumstances

Mr. Guzman was placed under arrest. Lieutenant Dragon then read Mr. Guzman the implied consent in which he refused a blood draw. Mr. Guzman was then transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident. All the above occurred in Lenoir City, TN.

Charges Follow Stop

Dennis Coleman,53, Willow Creek Apt. Madisonville, was charged with Financial Responsibility Law, Poss. Of Drug Para., Simple Possession, and Light Requiredon Motor Vehicle.

According to the report, Officer Eldridge LCPD, observed a truck (DVK225) traveling towards him on Browder Hollow Rd with a headlight out and partially on his side of the road. Officer turned around and initiated a traffic stop on Industrial Park at Highland Ave and made contact with the driver (Dennis Coleman). Mr. Coleman stated that he was borrowing the truck from a friend so he could haul his tools and was unaware it had

a headlight out and also failed to show a proof of insurance on the vehicle. Coleman consented to let officers check his eyes for a nystagmus but refused to go any further with a field sobriety test. Moneymakers was dispatched to the location to tow the vehicle due to having no insurance and an inventory of the vehicle resulted in officers finding 0.21 grams of a white powdered substance, in a small plastic bag in Coleman's duffle bag. Coleman

did admit to officers that it was powdered cocaine and forgot that it was in the vehicle. Coleman was placed into custody at that time without incident.

A further search of the vehicle resulted in officers also finding a glass pipe that had white residue on the inside (photographed). Moneymakers towed the vehicle and Coleman was transported to the Loudon Co Jail.

work to hold accountable those who steal funds from older adults, including by returning those funds to the victims where possible.

"We are committed to holding individuals accountable for criminally targeting older adult victims through fraudulent schemes," said United States Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III. "As with all law enforcesuccessful ment initiatives, our collaboration with our local, state, and federal partners is essential to protecting our community's older adults against scams."

During the period from September 2021 to September 2022, Department personnel and its law enforcement partners pursued approximately 260 cases involving more than 600 defendants, both bringing new cases and advancing those previously charged.

On April 6, 2022, in the Eastern District of Tennessee, a federal grand jury indictment returned an five Jamaican charging nationals with conspiracy to commit mail fraud, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1349, in case number 3:22-CR-33. According to the indictment, the scheme involved contacting an elderly individual by mail and informing her that she had won more than \$3 million through the Golden Casket International Sweepstakes. In subsequent phone calls, the victim was directed to make a series of payments to cover purported taxes and fees associated with her winnings. Prior to the defendants' apprehension, more than \$600,000 had been taken from the victim.

The trial of the five defendants is scheduled to begin on January 10, 2023, before the Honorable Judge Thom-

as A. Varlan, in Knoxville, Tennessee. The lead investigating agencies, are the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, the Department of Homeland Security, and the Lenoir City Police Department.

Department nounced that as part of its continuing efforts to protect older adults and bring perpetrators of fraud schemes to justice, it is expanding the Transnational Elder Fraud Strike Force, adding 14 new U.S. Attorney's Offices. Expansion of the Strike Force will help to coordinate the Department's ongoing efforts to combat largest and most harmful fraud schemes that target or disproportionately impact older adults.

In the past year, the Department has notified over 550,000 people that they may be eligible for remission payments. Notifications were made to consumers whose information was sold by one of three data companies prosecuted by the Department and were later victims of "sweepstakes" or "astrology" solicitations that falsely promised prizes or individualized services in return for a fee. More than 150,000 of those victims cashed checks totaling \$52 million, and thousands more are eligible to receive checks. Also notified were consumers who paid fraudsters perpetrating person-inneed scams and job scams via Western Union. In the past year, the Department has identified and contacted over 300,000 consumers who may be eligible for remission. Since March 2020 more than 148,000 victims have received more than \$366 million as a result of a 2017 criminal resolution with Western Union for the company's willful failure to maintain an effective anti-money laundering pro-gram and it's aiding and abetting of wire fraud.
