

Charged

Garrett Upshaw, 28, South Webb Road Ohio, was charged with Simple Possession, Poss. of drug Para., and Tampering/ Fabricating with Evidence.

Joseph Stewart, 42, Ruberia Avenue Florida, was charged with Driving while in Possession of Meth, Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. of Meth, Tampering/Fabricating with Evidence, Poss. of drug Para.

Deputy Parks LCSO, ran the registration of a white Ford Fusion (SC registration WSY302), and dispatched advised the registration to be suspended. Deputy initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle on Highway 72 at the intersection of Interstate 75. Deputy made contact with the driver, Mr. Joseph Stewart, and passenger,

Mr. Garrett Upshaw, and advised them of the reason for stop.

While speaking with the occupants, deputy observed a glass meth pipe in plain view in the console of the vehicle. Deputy asked the occupants to step out and asked them if there was anything other than pipe illegal in the vehicle. The two advised there was not and a probable cause search of the vehicle was performed. While searching the vehicle, Deputy Davis located a baggie containing 18.34 grams of meth under the drivers side of the vehicle, which Mr. Stewart had attempted to hide while exiting the vehicle. Based upon training and experience, this amount of methamphetamine is indicative of a larger narcotics operation and is generally not solely

for personal use. Mr. Stewart was placed under arrest and placed in the back of his patrol vehicle. Prior to conducting a pat search on Mr. Upshaw, he advised me he had a pipe on him and pulled it from beneath his underwear. Deputy took the pipe and placed Mr. Upshaw under arrest and advised him that if he had anything else illegal he needed to tell me before getting to the jail. Mr. Upshaw advised he did not and both he and Mr. Stewart were transported to

the jail. The drug and paraphernalia evidence was seized and the vehicle was towed from the scene by James. On scene at the jail, Mr. Upshaw advised corrections staff that he had a baggie of Xanax in his buttocks. Deputy took the baggie, which contained approximately 2.74 grams of possible Alprazolam. All evidence was bagged and placed into evidence, and the baggie from Mr. Stewart tested positive as Methamphetamine by TruNarc

Bryan Smith, 40, Texas Lane Kingston, was charged with Theft, and Driving on Revoked/ Suspended License.

Bryan J Smith has been under investigation for a theft that occurred at Tractor Supply located on Highway 321. The complainant, stated that a male stole a & leaf blower valued at \$349.99. The male exited the store and the alarm went off. Complainant confronted the male and the male stated "You cant stop me, and I don't care if you get my tag number". The complainant was able to get the registration 356BLLB that was displayed on a silver Chrysler mini van. The registration 356BLLB was supposed to be on a blue Dodge Durango registered to BRYAN SMITH.

Officer observed the Chrysler van leaving the Inn of Lenoir. Officer is familiar with SMITH and knew that his license were revoked. Officer traffic stopped SMITH for the the registration violation and DOR. Officer arrested SMITH for DOR and read

him his miranda rights. Officer questioned him about the theft of the leaf blower. SMITH did admit to stealing the leaf blower from Tractor Supply. He was also charged with the theft and transported to the Loudon County jail.

Ricky Furrow,53, Woodland Drive Loudon, was charged with Public Intoxication.

Officers with the LCPD were dispatched to the Loves Truck Stop in reference to a stolen vehicle. The complainant (Ricky Furrow) advised dispatch that his Silver Nissan Kick was stolen out of the parking lot. Officers arrived on scene and noticed a vehicle that met the description of the stolen vehicle (658BLCM) and a registration check did come back to the complainant. Officers made contact with the owner, who had bloodshot watery eyes, and seemed very confused and spaced out. While speaking with Furrow, he told officers that he had been drinking at his home in Loudon City, got hungry and decided to drive to the Loves Mcdonalds

to get food. Furrow consented to a SFST and during the HGN portion had a lack of smooth pursuit and a very delayed nystagmus in both eyes. The walk and turn and one leg stand were unable to be completed due to Furrow having bad knees. Furrow consented to a search of his vehicle and numerous bottles of alcohol were found. Furrow admitted to drinking a Bootlegger and also opened up a bottle of rum and took a "couple of sips". The odor of alcohol emanating

from Furrow gradually became stronger over the course of speaking with officers. Due to Furrow being a danger to himself and the public, he was placed in custody for being intoxicated in public and transported to the Loudon Co Jail. His vehicle was secured and left at the scene and an employee was advised of the vehicle's status. This did occur in Lenoir City, Loudon Co, TN.

Michael Crabtree, 27, Mincey Street Lenoir City, was charged with Man/ Sell/Del/Resale Sch. DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Officer Law LCPD, was on routine patrol when he observed a red Nissan Frontier with expired registration 09/2023. Officer then conducted a traffic stop at Town Creek @ Harrison Road and identified the driver to be Michael Crabtree. While speaking to Mr. Crabtree, the officer observed him to have blood shot waterv

eyes, and the odor of burnt marijuana emitting from the vehicle. Mr. Crabtree stated he had smoked marijuana earlier in the day prior to our encounter. Mr. Crabtree then consented to SFST, while performing HGN Mr. Crabtree could not follow his stimulus with his eyes without moving his head.

During the walk and turn Mr. Crabtree stepped off the line during the instruction phase, as well did an improper turn and missed four heel to toe touches on the way back. While performing the one leg stand, Mr. Crabtree placed his foot down several times. Sergeant Bialek was on scene to perform ARIDE, Sergeant Bialek stated he did perform unsatisfactorily.

Mr. Crabtree performed

poorly on all tests given and was placed under arrest for DUI. After placing him under arrest, he was read the Tennessee Blood and/or Breath Consent Advisement. After reading the consequences, Mr. Crabtree refused to submit a blood sample. During a search of his wallet, Sergeant Bialek located (2) one-dollar bills with .25 grams of a grey powder in each dollar bill totaling .50 grams. After advising Mr. Crabtree his Miranda warnings he refused to answer any questions but made a spontaneous utterance, saying the powder in the dollar bills was heroin. Mr. Crabtree was then transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident. All the above occurred in Lenoir City, TN.
