

Jessica Houghton, 42, Robinson Circle Lenoir City, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II, and Poss. of Drug Para.

Deputy Willis LCSO along with Deputy Brannon and Cpl. Sartin responded to a Overdose at the 66.5 Mile Marker on I-75 South Bound. Upon arrival deputies observed the Victim in the passenger seat of the vehicle conscious but struggling to breath or speak. Deputy Brannon along with Loudon Fire Rescue pulled the victim from the vehicle and placed him on the ground. EMS arrived on scene and took over medical aid. We made contact with Jessica Houghton Complainant

who stated Houghton he was driving when he turned grey and lost consciousness. Mrs. Houghton said she picked him up from the Loudon County Jail an hour prior to the incident occurring. Mrs. Houghton said he dropped her off at the house and then went to the gas station for about 20 minutes. When the victim arrived back at home the two of them got in the vehicle and were on their way to Mrs. Houghton's mother's house. Mrs. Houghton said he became quiet and quit breathing while driving in the fast lane. Mrs. Houghton said she navigated the vehicle to the shoulder of the road and put the vehicle in park. Mrs. Houghton said she then drug the victim to the passenger seat and administered two doses of Narcan.

While Cpl. Sartin was speaking with the female he asked if she had anything on her bra. Mrs. Houghton shook her bra out and two Gabapentin fell out on to the ground. Cpl. Sartin took Mrs. Houghton into custody due to these circumstances. Mrs. Houghton also produced a small cut straw with residue and a small container of brown powdery substance weighing 1.72 grams from her bra. EMS transported the victim to Sweetwater Hospital. This did occur in

Loudon County.



Gary Helton, 31, Church Drive Lenoir city, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. of Meth.

Officer R. Miller, with the Lenoir City Police Department, was conducting traffic enforcement in the area of West Hills Drive near Church Drive in Lenoir City,

TN. While conducting traffic enforcement, the officer observed a dark blue in color Nissan sedan turn left from Church Drive onto West Hills Drive. While observing the vehicle in which passed directly in front of his uniformed patrol unit, he positively identified the passenger to be, Gary Helton, whom officer knew from prior

knowledge had an active warrant out of Loudon County for a juvenile attachment. Officer then caught up to the vehicle and initiated a traffic stop in the driveway of Oakland Avenue. Upon the traffic stop the passenger, Gary Helton, exited the vehicle at which time the officer quickly made contact with him and placed him under arrest. Four separate indictments were issued on August 17, 2023. In the first indictment, referred to as the "college degree benefits fraud indictment." six defendants allegedly engaged in a conspiracy to defraud Antioch and Pittsburg police departments out of taxpayer dollars by claiming they had earned college credits toward degrees when, instead, they paid others to attend classes and take exams for them.

In June of 2019, an officer of the Pittsburg Police Department allegedly used a person identified as "Individual 1" to complete multiple college courses on his behalf that were credited toward the officer's Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice. Once the officer allegedly received a degree, they applied for and received reimbursements and pay increases from the Pittsburg Police

Department. The same officer allegedly promoted the services of Individual 1. Five other members of the police departments ended up paying Individual 1 to complete similar coursework towards their degrees. As with the initial officer, they also applied for reimbursements and pay increases from their law enforcement employer.

In the second indictment, two officers from the Antioch Police Department allegedly conspired to illegally distribute anabolic steroids to an unnamed customer. One of the officers allegedly possessed the drugs, and the other officer attempted to delete incriminating evidence from their cell phone before handing it over to law enforcement for investigation.

In the third indictment, a defendant from the Antioch Police Department received three charges, two involving alleged interference with a

the third involving the illegal seizure and destruction of a telephone. On March 23, several other incidents of 2021, the defendant was assigned to a wire room where the collection and sharing they were supposed to monitor communications between a target and others who contacted the target by telephone. The defendant allegedly used his personal cellphone to call a target, covering up any evidence of the call. On May 6, 2021, the defendant was present when another officer used a deployed a police dog while making an arrest. When the defendant saw a witness recording the aftermath of the incident on a cell phone, they allegedly seized

and destroyed it. The fourth indictment charges three Antioch police officers with conspiracy against rights and deprivation of rights under color of law. The indictment describes several incidents of excessive force, among others. Allegedly, the defendants 'punishment" "beyond any punishment apcriminal justice system.

For example, on August 24, 2021, one of the defendants, along with Antioch police officers, executed a search warrant at a residence, located a subject inside a locked bedroom holding a video game controller with a video game on a television screen. When the defendant and other officers entered the room, the subject raised his hands. The officers surrounded the subject, and while one of the officers held down the subject's arm to arrest him, the defendant deployed the 40mm less lethal launcher, injuring the subject.

Color of law violations strike at the very heart of our justice system. They undermine public confidence in the law and law enforcement and erode the fundamental Loudon County Tennessee






