SECOND DEGREE MURDER CONVICTION IN MORGAN COUNTY FATAL OVERDOSE NETS DRUG SUPPLIER 15 YEARS TO SERVE AT 100%




Anthony Shelley and Tammy Conner were convicted on Monday on charges related to the overdose death of the victim from fentanyl which death occurred in Deer Lodge on May 21, 2022. Shelley provided fentanyl to Conner in exchange for oxycodone pills.

Morgan County Sheriff's Office responded to the residence and found that three individuals had taken the illegal narcotics. Conner and another were able to be revived by law enforcement and EMS, but not the deceased whose autopsy revealed that he died from a combination of fentan-





Ms. Cain was then placed under arrest and read Implied Consent, to which she also re-

After being read implied advised she was tired and had consent, Ms. Cain nodded off and had to be startled to regain her attention. While inventorying the vehicle prior to tow, prescriptions for Clonazepam, Buprenorphine, and Gabapentin were located. The vehicle was towed from the scene by James, and Ms. Cain was transported to the jail without incident. All of the above occurred in Loudon County, Tennessee.

U.S. Attorney's Office Announces Participation in Justice Department's Nationwide Election Day Program

The United States Attorney's Office announced today that Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) Mac Heavener will lead the efforts of the Office in connection with the Justice Department's nationwide Election Day Program for the upcoming November 2023, general election. AUSA Heavener has been appointed to serve as the District Election Officer (DEO) for the Eastern District of Tennessee, and in that capacity is responsible for overseeing the Office's handling of election day complaints of voting rights concerns, threats of violence to election officials or staff, and election fraud, in consultation with Justice Department Headquarters in

Washington.

The Department of Justice has an important role in deterring and combatting discrimination and intimidation at the polls, threats of violence directed at election officials and poll workers, and election fraud. The Department will address these violations wherever they occur. The Department's fongstanding Election Day Program furthers these goals and also seeks to ensure public confidence in the elecforal process by providing local points of contact within the Department for the public to report possible federal election law violations.

Federal law protects against such crimes as threatening violence against election officials or staff, intimidating or bribing voters, buying and selling votes, impersonating voters, altering vote tallies, stuffing ballot boxes, and marking ballots for voters against their wishes or without their in-It also contains special protections for the rights of voters, and provides that they

can vote free from interference, including intimidation, and other acts designed to prevent or discourage people from voting or voting for the candidate of their choice. The Voting Rights Act protects the right of voters to mark their own ballot or to be assisted by a person of their choice (where voters need assistance because of disability or inability to read or write in English).

In order to respond to complaints of voting rights concerns and election fraud during the upcoming election, and to ensure that such complaints are directed to the appropriate authorities, AUSA Heavener will be on duty in this District while the polls are open. He can be reached by the public at the following telephone numbers: (423) 823-5009 or (423) 218-6652.

In addition, the FBI will have special agents available

in each field office and resident agency throughout the country to receive allegations of election fraud and other election abuses on election

day. The local FBI field office can be reached by the public at (865) 544-0751.

Complaints about possible violations of the federal voting rights laws can be made directly to the Civil Rights Division in Washington, DC by phone at 800-253-3931 or by complaint form at https://civil-

rights.justice.gov/.

Ensuring free and fair elections depends in large part on the assistance of the Ameri-can electorate," stated United States Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III. "It is important that those who have specific information about voting rights concerns or election fraud make that information available to the Department of Justice.

Please note, however, in the case of a crime of violence or intimidation, please call 911 immediately and before contacting federal authorities. State and local police have primary jurisdiction over polling places, and almost always have faster reaction capacity in

an emergency.
