



Wreck

Billy Collins, 48, Cedar Grove Street Loudon, was charged with DUI, Driving on Revoked/Suspended License, Poss. Of Drug Para., Poss. Of Meth, and Simple Possession x2.

Deputy R. Fleming LCSO, responded to a wreck with injury at Pine Grove Providence Rd between two vehicles involved in a headon collision. Upon arrival, Deputy made contact with Billy Collins/Offender who was injured inside his vehicle, which was down the embankment in a creek bed. Mr. Collins said to EMS and Deputy that he passed out and ran into oncoming traffic causing a head-on collision. Mr. Collins was assisted out of the vehicle by EMS and Law Enforcement personnel. Based on Deputy training and experience, he suspected Mr. Collins was under the influence of a drug or intoxicant. It was also discovered that Mr. Collins had a revoked driver's license from a prior DUI. After further investigation, Deputy discovered multiple needles (one still with a substance inside of it), pipes, and other drug paraphernalia. Mr. Collins was taken by ambulance to FT. Loudoun Medical Center for medical treatment for injuries sustained in the crash.

While in the ambulance. Mr. Collins admitted to using heroin earlier in the day. Deputy concluded, based on his investigation, that Mr. Collins was under the influence of a drug or intoxicant that impaired his ability to safely operate a motor vehicle on a public roadway. Once at the hospital, Mr. Collins was read his Miranda rights and was also read the TN Implied Consent form 55-10-407. Mr. Collins then consented to give a blood sample. The offender also admitted that the substance in the syringe was Methamphetamine. Mr. Collins was treated for a broken heel and then discharged from the ER. Deputy then placed the Offender into custody for Driving Under The Influence TCA 55-10-401, Driving on a revoked license 55-50-504, and Drug Para-


phemalia TCA 39-17-425. Mr. Collins was transported to Loudon County Jail with no further incident. The needles/syringes were properly disposed of in an appropriate sharps container. The other paraphernalia that was seized was submitted into evidence to be destroyed. All the above occurred in Loudon County, TN.



was conducting a patrol in the area of Highway 321 South in


Lenoir City, TN

During patrol duties Officer observed a white in color Nissan sedan with heavily tinted windows traveling south on Highway 321. Officer con-ducted a traffic stop in the area of Town Creek Parkway near Market Drive in Lenoir

City. Windows registered at 14%. Upon the traffic stop Officer made contact with a single male occupant who was the driver, Dylan West. While speaking with WEST Officer noticed that his entire body trembling and noticed that he seemed uncomfortable when speaking with him. Of-ficer then had WEST step out of the vehicle to speak with him about a citation. When speaking with WEST about the citation, central dispatch, advised that WEST'S license status was revoked for a driving while under the influence charge stemming from 2015. During the roadside investigation Officer had K9 Cpl. C Grav from the Loudon County Sheriff's Office respond to my location to conduct an open-air sniff of the vehicle with his K9 partner Kora. Once on scene an open air sniff on the exterior of the vehicle was conducted where Cpl C. Gray advised that Kora positively alerted to an odor of narcotics coming from inside of the vehicle. A probable cause search of the vehicle was conducted where a bag containing a crystal-like substance that tested positive for methamphetamine through the Tru Narc analyzer was recovered in the wallet containing WEST'S Tennessee Identification Card along with his debit/credit cards. An additional bag containing a crystal-like substance was recovered from behind the back seat that WEST was sitting in while in custody in the back seat of his police cruiser. The total amount of methamphetamine located was (0.68 grams).





Couple Sentenced For Conspiracy, Wire Fraud, And Major Fraud Against The United States

Ricky and Katrina Lanier, 55 and 49, both of LaGrange, N.C., were sentenced by the Honorable Travis McDonough, Chief United States District Court Judge for the Eastern District of Tennessee at Chattanooga, to serve federal prison terms of 48 months and 24 months, respectively, for conspiracy to commit wire fraud, wire fraud, and major fraud against the United States. Following their incarceration, the Laniers will each be on supervised release for a period of one year. Chief Judge McDonough ordered forfeiture of the couple's bank accounts and deferred a roling on a money judgement until a later date.

The couple were found guilty of these offenses, in violation of 18 U.S.C. §§ 1349, 1343, and 1031 on July 29, 2022, following a two-week jury trial in U.S. District Court. According to evidence presented at trial, the Laniers conspired from 2005 to 2013 to defraud the United States government through a scheme to fraudulently obtain federal contracts intended to be awarded to businesses lawfully participating in the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business (SDVOSB) program and the Small Business Administration's (SBA) 8(a) Business Development program. They falsely represented that JMR Investments and Kylee Construction were eligible for these programs. Their actions also deprived legitimate

service-disabled veteran and minority-owned businesses from obtaining government contracts on which they were eligible to bid.

Ricky Lanier, who had previously owned and operated an 8(a) business receiving government contracts, became ineligible to participate in the 8(a) program after that business graduated from that program in 2008. Lanier used a long-time friend and service-disabled veteran as the purported owner of Kylee Construction, falsely representing that the friend was involved in the daily management of the business, even while the friend was working for a government contractor in Afghanistan. The Laniers used a minority-owned business run by Ricky Lanier's college roommate, JMR Investments, as a front to obtain construction contracts from the National Park Service and other federal agencies under the 8(a) program, misrepresenting the friend's involvement in the management and operation of the business. The scheme also involved sub-contracting most of the work on the contracts in violation of program requirements. As part of the scheme, the Laniers opened and controlled bank accounts into which government money was deposited, and they used those accounts to pay for extravagant vacations; monthly payments on a personal private airplane; a Mercedes Benz; mongage payments for their personal residence; purchases of additional real estate; and purchases of personal property such as shoes, clothing, food, and souvenirs while on vacation.

The Laniers also defrauded the National Park Service in connection with a contract to replace a wastewater treatment facility at the Tremont Institute in the Great Smoley Mountains National Park, falsely representing subcontractor costs by over \$400,000, resulting in the award of a \$1.1 million contract for work on the project that was actually performed by a subcontractor for only \$550,000. The Laniers further fraudulently obtained a \$1.3 million construction contract at the James H. Quillen VA Medical Center, which had been set aside for service-disabled veteran owned businesses.
