### Camp

Tamara Carlson, 36, Homeless Lenoir City, was charged with Public Intoxication, and Reckless Burning.

Deputy Pendleton LCSO, was dispatched to Morganton campground located at the intersection of East Coast Tellico Parkway and Morganton Cemetery Road in reference to a possible domestic and fire. After walking into the woods a short distance Deputies came in contact with Mrs. Tamara Carlson who began walking towards Deputy stumbling and fell onto the ground in front of him. Mrs. Carlson was complaining of her mouth and back hurting. She stated that victim had punched her in the face and struck her in the back with a large stick. Mrs. Carlson's mouth was bleeding and she did have a large red mark across her back. Mrs. Carlson denied medical treatment for her injuries. We walked to the parking lot and Mrs. Carlson sat on the curb, she then fell backwards into a parked car, stating that she had con-

sumed "1.5 liters of wine". Mrs. Carlson appeared to be intoxicated, a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage was coming from her person and she was sluming her words. Mrs. Carlson stated that she and her husband, were having an argument over past marital problems and lost cigarettes. She knocked their tent into their campfire setting it afire. She then attempted to release their dog from his chain and was struck by her husband. Deputy spoke with her husband, and two witnesses. The husband confirmed Tamara's story, but stated that she was not trying to release the dog. The husband believed that Tamara was attempting to burn the dog with a cigarette, she had the dog by the neck and was trying to press a lit cigarette into the dog's ear. To prevent the animal cruelty, he struck her and got her away from the dog. The husband also advised that Tamera had consumed a whole bottle of wine prior to his arrival. Deputy spoke with the witness, who are residing at the campsite adjacent to the Carlson's. They heard a com-

motion and noticed the husband was walking away. They then heard Tamara yell "I am going to burn it all". Then the husband approached their campsite and said "Help she is going to burn it all." they went to the campsite to help. They both observed a tent and the vegetation around it on fire. They put the fire out and the witness walked away to call 911. Witness 2 stayed at the campsite and witnessed Tamara attempt to burn the dog with a cigarette, witness 2 also witnessed the husband strike Tamara to prevent harm to the dog. Deputies

did observe the damage at the campsite, a tent had been burnt but was moved nearly 10ft from its original spot to be placed into the fire. A small portion of the vegetation around the camp fire had been burnt in result to the large tent being placed onto the fire. Based on the totality of circumstances, Deputy believe that Tamera was a danger to herself and the public due to her level of intoxication. She was placed into custody and transported to The Loudon County Jail. All the above did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.





Sgt. Rogers LCSO, observed a black sedan traveling at a high rate of speed on 175 NB in the area of the 67mm. Sgt. paced the vehicle at 82mph in a 70mph zone. While observing the vehicle Sgt. 

purchase. Saine, who was not prohibited from purchasing a firearm, completed the required paperwork using her information and paid for the two firearms. She also purchased a laser aiming device for the pistol.

Surveillance video from the FFL showed Saine at the FFL's gun counter handing the firearms to the felon who was accompanying her and, after she completed the purchase, the felon leaving the FFL's premises while carrying one of the firearms. Saine admitted to law enforcement that she had met the felon while she was a contract employee of the Tennessee Department of Correction, and that the felon was incarcerated on a felony conviction at the prison where she had worked as a nurse. She also admitted that she was in a relationship with the felon, knew he was a felon, and that he had traveled to and from the FFLs premises with her.

Law enforcement also recovered a text message from a cell phone that Saine sent the felon after the purchase of the firearms that said, "I've got your gun and stuff in the house." A cooperating witness testified that they saw the felon with the pistol and were able to recognize the firearm be-

cause of the attached laser aiming device and distinctive markings on the firearm.

U.S. Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III of the Eastern District of Tennessee; and ATF Special Agent in Charge Marcus S. Watson made the announcement.

The criminal indictment was the result of an investigation by the Kingsport Police Department and ATF. This investigation was led by ATF Task Force Officer Mike Slater.

Assistant United States Attorney B. Todd Martin and Special Assistant U.S. Attorney Blake Watson represented the United States.

This case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and gun violence, and to make our neighborhoods safer for everyone. On May 26, 2021, the Department launched a violent crime reduction strategy strengthening PSN based on these core principles: fostering trust and legitimacy in our communities. supporting community-based organizations that help prevent violence from occurring in the first place, setting focused and strategic enforcement priorities, and measuring the results.






