



Juan Klinger, 21, Laura Lee Lane Knoxville, was charged with DUI, Driving on Revoked Suspended License, and Open Control.

Officer Sparks LCPD, was dispatched to the area of Creekwood Park Blvd and Highway 321 North in reference to a dark gray Honda Accord bearing Tennessee Registration that the complainant advised was driving "all over the road" and driving at a slow speed. Upon arrival to the area, Officer observed a Honda Accord matching the description of the vehicle the complainant provided bearing the same registration. Officer conducted a traffic stop of the Honda Accord at Town Creek Parkway and Town Creek Road West. Upon approaching the vehicle Officer made contact with the driver who was later identified as being Juan S. Klinger. When the driver rolled down the window Officer immediately noticed the odor of alcohol emitting from the vehicle, and the driver, Mr. Klinger, had bloodshot glossy eyes and slurred speech. When Mr. Klinger opened the

door to the vehicle I observed two open alcoholic beverages inside the driver side door where Mr. Klinger was seated. Mr. Klinger stated that he had one 23.5 Fl. Oz. Four Loko at approximately 1300 the same day. Upon conducting a consensual search of the vehicle, Officers located a total of 2 - 23.5 Fl. Oz Cans of Four Loko, and 4 - 6.8 Fl. Oz. bottles of Four Loko Pregame shots, all opened, and a vape with a label stating it was Delta 8. The passenger of the vehicle advised that they were on the way to her residence, coming from a fair. The passenger advised that she had not consumed any alco-hol, and that she did not know where all the opened containers had come from. Due to the open containers found inside the vehicle, the indicators observed while speaking with Mr. Klinger, and Mr. Klinger's performance on the SFSTs, Upon arrival to the jail Mr. Klinger provided a sample of his breath for testing, and the sample was collected by Off. A. Lee 421, and resulted in a Blood Alcohol Content of .082

"Even two decades later, it's a day of devastation we keep reliving, year after year, as we lose more and more members of our FBI family to illnesses related to their work on and in the aftermath of 9/11," Director Wray said. "Our nation owes Lou and Bryan a debt that we can never repay. Both were selfless, caring people who wouldn't think twice about putting the lives of those we serve in front of their own. And that is exactly what they did."

FBI Director Christopher Wray spoke at a Wall of Honor Memorial Ceremony on May 11, 2023 at FBI Head-quarters and laid a wreath to honor the 92 Bureau employees who have lost their lives in the line of duty since 1925. Two new names were added to the FBI's Wall of Honor: Supervisory Police Officer (Lt.) Yiu Tak "Louis" Tao and Supervisory Administrative Specialist Bryan A. Myers. Both died in 2022

from illnesses related to toxic air exposure during 9/11 recovery efforts.

The weeklong recognition of police officers dates back to 1962, when President John F. Kennedy designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day, and the week in which that date falls as Police Week.

The May 14 vigil, organized by the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund, included a roll-call of officers who died on the job in 2022. The organization's memorial—a short distance from the U.S. Capitol—features two curving, 304-foot marble walls engraved with the names of more than 22,600 officers who have died while performing their duty since 1791.

The losses were underscored by the FBI's recent release of statistics showing that 118 law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty in 2022. So far in 2023, 22 law enforcement officers have lost their lives in the line of duty.






