

out to be a 9 mm handgun. According to the statement of the mother and the statement of the father, who was at work at the time, it is believed that the father placed or keeps the loaded handgun in a holster on top of the refrigerator in the kitchen. The mother stated that the victim evidently used a chair, as he sometime does, to climb up on the countertops in the kitchen. This time he apparently reached on top of the refrigerator to get the gun and somehow shot himself one time in the upper chest

Morgan County EMS arrived and rendered

the victim was flown to UT Medical Center. According to Sheriff Potter, the boy was later transferred to Children's Hospital and released on Saturday. The gunshot went entirely through the child's body without hitting vital organs but did fracture his shoulder. Otherwise, the child is doing well.

Sheriff Potter also reported that DCS has been to the house several times regarding this boy and that DCS was immediately notified by the Morgan County Sheriff after he arrived on scene at the direction of District Attorney General Russell Johnson.

This is the second shooting The mother called 911 at of a child with a loaded handgun being kept in the home in General Johnson's four counimmediate medical aid and tv district in the last week.

Brandon Fontenot, 23, Double Tree Road Knoxville, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Parks LCSO, observed a silver Kia Optima bearing the tag of BPB5010 traveling on Interstate 75 SB at 90 mph and failing to maintain lane. While catching up with the vehicle deputy Parks observed multiple times that the driver failed to maintain lane. Deputy Parks initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle at the 81 mile marker and approached the vehicle. Deputy made contact with the driver, Mr. Brandon Fontenot, and advised him of the reason for stop and asked for his ID, registration, and insurance. While speaking with Mr. Fontenot deputy observed slurred speech, an inability to maintain focus, and Mr. Fontenot searched for the registration for a significant amount of time. Deputy Parks asked Mr. Fontenot if he would step out of the vehicle and observed him having a difficulty maintaining balance. When asked if he had drank any alcohol he advised he had.

Deputy asked if he would be willing to perform Standardized Field Sobriety Tests, and he refused. Mr. Fontenot was placed under arrest and read implied consent, to which he refused. During a vehicle inventory prior to tow, an empty alcohol beverage was located in the vehicle. The vehicle was towed by Malones and Mr. Fontenot was transported to the Loudon County Justice Center without incident. All of the above occurred in Loudon County, Tennessee.



Dear Editor,

On some anniversaries we celebrate. On others we reflect

The 21th Anniversary of the attack on America and New York's World Trade Center is one of the times for reflection. There is truly nothing to celebrate in the extraordinary tragedy of 9/11.

The way we show our appreciation differs from community to community and location to


location, but everyone involved knows they have the support and encouragement of our company.



Larry Dunlap, 39, Wilkinson Pike Maryville, was charged with DUI.

Deputy Davis LCSO, responded to Hickory Valley Road. In reference to an unresponsive male laying in the parking lot of the Top-Notch Boat Repair. Upon arrival, EMS was loading an unresponsive male later identified as Larry Dunlap into the ambulance. Deputy Davis could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from Larry's person. EMS administered a dose of Narcan by IV to Larry. Larry regained consciousness but was incoherent and seizing. Larry was transported to Fort Loudon Medical Center for further treatment. Deputy made contact with the complainant who advised he received a phone call of an individual laying in the parking lot of his shop. Complainant stated he arrived on scene and found an unresponsive male laying on

the gravel on the passenger side of his car. Complainant advised he shortly after called 911. Bryan stated he did not know this male and he was not associated with his business and had no reason to be on his property. Deputy made contact with the witness who advised he was driving on Hickory Valley Road when he saw a white male laying in the parking lot of Top-Notch Boat Repair. Witness stated he called the property owner Bryan Brisson to advise him of the situation. Complainant stated he wanted the vehicle towed from his business. As Deputy approached the vehicle, he noticed that the vehicle was still running. Deputy saw a clear liquor bottle in plain view between the driver's seat and the center console of the vehicle. Deputy Allen later located multiple clear liquor bottles in the glove compartment of the vehicle. Given the statements listed above, Deputy believe a reasonable person would believe Larry drove the vehicle to the parking lot of the Top-Notch Boat Repair. Due to the totality of the circumstances, Deputy believe Larry was over the legal limit of an intoxicant and was unfit to safely operate a motor vehicle. Shortly after clearing the scene, Deputy arrived at Fort Loudon Medical Center to attempt to read Larry Implied Consent Law. Larry was incoherent and belligerent and was unable to consent or deny a blood and or breath sample. A warrant has been generated for Larry for driving under the influence. This incident occurred in Loudon County Tennessee.






