

and Wildlife Commission approved a new rule for threatened and endangered species, heard presentations on bear management, and saw special presenta-2023 meeting.

The Endangered Species Act of 1973 established protections for fish, wildlife, and plants that are listed as threatened or endangered, and pro-

The Tennessee Fish vides a means for adding species to and removing them from the list of threatened and endangered species. The list is renewed every two years. Josh Campbell, Ten-

tions made in its final nessee Wildlife Resources Agency Biodiversity Division Chief, previewed the rule to establish the state list at the TFWC October meeting, and the Commission voted to approve at the December

meeting. There were 27 species removed from the endangered, threatened, or in need of management list. There were 28 species added to the list, bringing the total to 144 Twenty-two species. species were upgraded from species of greatest conservation need. Four new species with no previous designations were added, and

Due to the amount of narcotics present, as well as the scale and individual containers, it is believed Mr. Green is involved in the manufacture, sell, or delivery of narcotics. Mr. Green was placed under arrest and the above items were seized.

The other passengers were released from the scene and Mr. Green was transported to the Loudon County Justice Center without incident. The evidence was bagged and placed into evidence. All of the above occurred in Loudon County, Tennessee.



Diego Garcia, 23, Bell Road Loudon, was charged with DUI, Violation of Implied Consent, Man/Sell/Del/ Resale Sch. VI, and Poss. of Drug Para.

Deputy Brooke Slattery LCSO, was dispatched to Roberson Spring Road reference to a wreck without injury to a Loudon City marked patrol vehicle. Upon arrival, Deputy observed a Hispanic male, Diego Garcia who was the driver of a Toyota Camry, red in color with Tennessee tag 266BKBL that was involved in the crash (Titan report 20240130015). Once Deputy made contact with Diego, she observed that his eyes were bloodshot and glossy eyes the deputy detected a strong odor of raw marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. Deputy asked Diego when was the last time he smoked and he replied, an hour to an hour half ago before he was


driving. Deputy then asked if there was any marijuana inside the vehicle and he replied, ves in the backseat. Deputy asked Diego for consent to search the vehicle and he said ves. A consent search of the vehicle revealed a approximately 1.68 oz. of marijuana and THC gummies located in a black diaper bag in the back seat that was individually packaged. Deputy also recovered a scale and grinder commonly used as drug paraphernalia .Based on the deputy investigation for DUI, deputy asked Diego if he was willing to submit to field sobriety test and he said yes. Deputy placed him into custody for drug possession and transported him to Loudon County Jail. While at the jail the deputy performed the field sobriety test at which time Diego performed poorly on the test. Deputy then charged him with DUI also. the deputy asked him if he was willing to

John Davlin, 31 Casey Road Harriman, was charged with Aggravated Assault, and Retaliation for Past Acts.

Deputy Davis LCSO, responded to the area of Interstate 40 West at mile marker 367, in reference to a physical domestic. Upon arrival, the Deputy located a silver minivan pulled over on the shoulder of the Interstate with its hazard lights on. Upon approach, the deputy heard screaming coming from the vehicle. Deputy ordered the front passenger (John Davlin) out of the vehicle and detained him. Deputy patted John down for weapons and placed him in the back of his patrol car. Deputy made contact with the complainant/ victim. Deputy observed red markings on the victim neck, a laceration to her right ear, and a purple bruise on her


right eye. Corporal Wallen photographed the physical markings on the victim. The victim advised she and John were returning home from Doordashing when they got into an argument about possibly divorcing. The victim stated John was extremely intoxicated and belligerent. The victim stated she attempted to drop John off at the Watt Road exit, but John refused to exit the vehicle. The victim stated they continued home, but she later pulled back over at the 367-mile marker on Interstate 40 West due to John's belligerent behavior. The victim stated John began strangling her with his right hand. The victim stated John proceeded to punch her in the face and shortly after bit her right ear. The victim consented to write a written statement of the altercation. Deputy made contact with

John and asked him his side of the story. John stated they got into an argument after Doordashing. John stated he only grabbed the victim by the shirt during the physical altercation. Due to the facts given above and the physical evidence observed, the deputy determined John was the primary aggressor and took him into custody. During the transport to the jail, John made many threats towards the deputy. Such as, "Your wife and kids will feel something different by the time I get out, I learned how to put a bullet in your damn chest, and your address is a public

record". The statements given above were recorded by his body worn camera and his in-car camera. John was also charged with Retaliation of Past Action due to the threats towards the deputy during the transport to the jail. The victim received medical treatment by EMS for her injuries but refused to go to the hospital. The victim and John's children were also present in the vehicle during the physical altercation occurred. A DCS referral has been reported due the children being present. This incident occurred in Loudon County Tennessee.

two species were adopted as the result of federal delisting.

Once it receives final approval by the Tennessee General Assembly, the list will include 31 endangered species, up six from the 2021 list. Threatened species stand at 47, 14 additional since 2021. In need of management species are down 19 from the previous list for a total of 66 species. The list will be available on the TWRA website and will guide wildlife management and conservation efforts in the state.

Bill Stiver, Supervisory Wildlife Biologist, with the Great Smoky Mountains National Park (GSMNP) discussed Cooperative Bear Management and the results of a research project the park is completing. In recent years, the park has fitted relocated bears with GPS radio collars to assess the survival and movement of bears after

release.

Dan Gibbs, Black Bear Coordinator for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, discussed how the GSMNP research results can assist with the Agency's goal of implementing proactive approaches to reduce human-bear conflicts. He provided results from a public opinion survey that showed 93 percent of the public enjoys that bears exist and are important to the ecosystem. It also showed that 88 percent were aware that bears take advantage of unconventional food sources, 76 percent believe preventative action is needed, 69 percent approve of laws and ordinances, and 88 percent approve of laws prohibiting intentional feeding. He also discussed steps the city of Gatlinburg is taking which include the addition of 460 new bear-proof dumpsters.



submit to a blood draw and he said no. Diego was charged with manufacture, sell, deliver, schedule VI, DUI, Implied consent and drug paraphernalia. This did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.

Villager Charged with DUI Tatjana Hardy, 34, Oostanali Way Loudon, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Officer Law LCPD, was on routine patrol when he observed a dark colored sedan make a wide left turn onto Highway 11 E from Highway 321. 


