Lucas Omary, 31, Homeless Loudon, was charged with Domestic Assault.

Deputy Eric Curtis LCSO, was at the EZ Stop on Broadway during his normal patrol shift and was approached by a heavyset elderly male who was bloodied on his elbow and had a cut on the right side of his face and minor swelling on the left side of his face near his nose.

Identified as the victim, he stated that he had been assaulted at his home on Stevens Ln by Lucas Omary, a fellow tenant of that residence. The victim stated that Omary got into his face during an argument and struck him with an empty, closed fist. The victim was knocked over the woodpile and Omary continued to strike him. A witness, was with the victim at the time of the report and corroborat-

ed these events. The deputy acquired written statements from both victim and witness and before he could complete his interview, the victim was transported by EMS due to dizziness and being unsteady on his feet. The deputy then went to Stevens Ln with Deputy N Reagan and located Lucas. The deputy asked him what had happened, and Lucas admitted to striking Childress. The deputy then placed Lucas under arrest and deputy Reagan transported him to the Loudon County Jail without incident. Upon arrival at the jail, the deputy read Lucas his Miranda Rights, and he stated that the victim had been bringing someone around the kids that was of poor character and that the victim had been, "talking out of his head." He apologized for striking the victim and admitted that he had lost his temper. This did occur in Loudon County, TN.



Benjamin Simon, 20, Butternut Circle Knoxville, was charged with DUI.

Officer Carroll LCPD. was dispatched to the area of Hwy 321 N in the area of McGhee Blvd in reference to a Reckless Driver call. While in the area, the officer observed the vehicle in question(235BLTK) in the Weigel's parking lot on Hwy 321 N. The officer was able to make contact with the driver of the vehicle, who was identified as Benjamin Arthur Simon. While speaking with Mr. Simon, the officer noticed that he had watery, bloodshot eyes, and the odor of alcohol emitting from his breath. Mr. Simon admitted that he had drank a little vodka, and that he had driven the vehicle to Weigel's. The officer asked Mr. Simon if he would be willing to perform Standardized Field Sobriety test-

ing, to which he consented. During the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test, Mr. Simon had lack of smooth pursuit, Nystagmus while eyes were at Maximum Deviation, and Onset Nystagmus prior to 45 degrees. During the Walk and Turn test, Mr. Simon used arms for balance, missed heel to toe, stepped off line, and turned improperly. During the Oneleg Stand test, Mr. Simon used arms for balance, put his foot down, and counted improperly. The officer also conducted ARIDE testing in which Mr. Simon performed poorly. Mr. Simon was placed into custody, and read Implied Consent, to which he consented. Mr. Simon was transported to Ft. Loudon Medical Center for a blood test, and then to the Loudon County Jail. Former Jackson Police business. Aviation Chief Pilot Indicted for Theft

An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has resulted in the indictment of Terry Hopper, the former Chief Pilot of the Jackson Police Aviation Unit. The investigation began after Jackson Police Department totaled \$23,146.89, and his officials reported questionable payroll transactions.

Investigators determined that Hopper improperly re- found that Hopper abused ceived at least \$29,499.07 in his assigned City of Jackunearned wages and employer-paid benefits between May 1, 2021 and August 31, 2022.
