Online platform provides current data on suicides, aims to reduce stigma

An FBI database established in 2021 to help prevent law enforcement suicides and increase awareness and understanding of the occurrences is now online.

The Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection (LESDC) was recently added to the FBI's Crime Data Explorer platform, a dynamic online clearinghouse of FBI statistics and research.

Yahir Alonso, 19, Reeds Springs Road Philadelphia, was charged with Underage Driving while Intoxicated, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Davis LCSO, was patrolling his assigned zone when the deputy encountered a suspicious Ford F-150 parked at the closed Sunoco Gas Station gas pumps located at 19997 W Lee Highway. The Ford F-150 was running stationary at the gas pumps but was not filling its gas tank. Upon approach, the deputy observed a Hispanic male later identified as

Yahir Alonso passed out in the driver's seat of the vehicle. The deputy knocked on the vehicle's window multiple times to get Mr. Alonso's attention. Mr. Alonso woke up and went back to sleep two times before he acknowledged the deputy. Mr. Alonso rolled the window down to speak with him. Mr. Alonso had slurred speech when speaking, red glassy eyes, and the deputy could spell the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his breath. Mr. Alonso had a very inconsistent travel story. Mr. Alonso also thought his friend T-Rex was still in the

vehicle, but he was not present. Mr. Alonso stated he had one Bud Light at a friend's house before driving but later changed his story to two Bud lights. Mr. Alonso consented to conduct the Standardized Field Sobriety Test. During the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test, the deputy observed the following clues, lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. During the Walk and Turn Test, the deputy observed the following clues, failing to remain in the starting position during the instructional phase of the test, starting the test too soon, missing heel to toe on the 4th, 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th step on the first 9 steps, missing heel to toe on the 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, and 9th step on the second 9 steps, improper turn, and stepped off the line on the 3rd step of the second 9 steps. During the One Leg Stand test, the deputy observed the following clues, placing his foot down 3 times, and swaying.

Based on the deputy observation of Mr. Alonso's physical state, his own admission to consuming an alcoholic beverage before driving, and his performance on the Standardized Field Sobriety Test. The deputy concluded Mr. Alonso was in physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of a drug or intoxicant that impaired his ability to safely operate a motor vehicle on a public roadway. Mr. Alonso was read implied consent and refused to give a sample for chemical testing. Mr. Alonso was transported to the Loudon County Detention Facility with no further incident. This incident occurred in Loudon County, TN.

Brittany Robinette, 35, Robinson Spring Road Loudon, was charged with Assault.

Sgt. Brian Smith LCSO, was the acting School Resource Officer at Fort Loudoun Middle School for a basketball game. Principal Harris and Sgt. were investigating a disturbance, when Sgt. Smith turned to see two females at the bottom of the stands screaming at each other. While approaching the two, to separate them, he witnessed the suspect swing her right arm toward the face of the victim in a clear and intentional manor to assault the victim. The Sgt. did separate the two by escorting the suspect to the hallway and identified her to be Brittany Nichole Robinette. The Sgt. then made contact with the other female and found her to be the victim who stat-





law enforcement agencies have reported nine suicides and three attempted suicides. All the suicide victims were males—seven were white. one was Black, and one was Hispanic or Latino. Firearms were used in seven suicides: two were listed as "other." The collection does not collect information that identifies individuals.

As with crime statistics, the ideal is to have more agencies report to the LES-DC so that a more represen-

tative picture emerges. Law enforcement agencies are not required to submit suicide information to the FBI; it's voluntary. But the Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection Act, passed in 2020, requires the attorney general and the FBI to report the suicide data annually to Congress. The FBI, which has a nearly century-long history of collecting data from law enforcement agencies, began collecting the information from agencies on January 1,

Agencies can submit information to the LESDC through an online portal with CJIS. The information categories include:

Circumstances and events that occurred before each suicide or attempted suicide

General location

Demographic information Occupational category

Method used

Rather than just meeting the annual reporting requirement, CJIS explored developing a more responsive model that could present data to the public as soon as it has been validated. The model follows similar evolutions in the FBI's reporting of data

on topics like hate crimes, the use of force, and law enforcement officers who are killed or wounded in the line of duty. These used to be reported annually. But with the online Crime Data Explorer. the Bureau has been able to release numbers on a more rolling basis.

"The effort now is to take all the data collections we have, including LESDC, and automate them in such a way that the data is validated in as real-time as possible,' said Edward Abraham, unit chief of the Crime and Law Enforcement Statistics Unit at CJIS. "It's real-time in the sense that as soon as we receive it and validate it, it is going out."

Producing a current and objective picture of law enforcement suicides also help reduce the stigma around law enforcement seeking mental health help.






