

Charged

James McMahan, 29, Pine Grove Providence Road Loudon, was charged with Domestic Assault, and Resisting Arrest.

Deputy Broderick, Deputy Miller, Deputy Watson, and Deputy Mccally LCSO, received a 911 call for a domestic in progress at Pine Grove Providence Road. The caller advised 911 that her husband was drinking, and throwing things around and had just put his hands on her. Upon arrival, officers located the victim/ complainant, outside of her vehicle. The victim told officers the following had happened. That tonight they were having a get-together for their anniversary and that everyone had already left. The victim stated that her husband, James McMahan (suspect), had fallen asleep while she was attempting to clean things up. She stated that she had tapped McMahan on his arm to wake him up so that he could help when he became angry. She stated that he started yelling and flipping tables and then took her car keys, jumped in her car, and started doing circles in the street. She stated that he then got out of the vehicle and threw her keys. They continued having a verbal argument when Mc-Mahan got upset and charged toward her, pushing her. She advised she stumbled backward into the table. She stated that he attempted to come at her again when she grabbed his mother, and stood behind her. She stated that stopped him from attacking her further, at which time she called the police.

Deputies located the suspect sitting in his vehicle, refusing to exit his vehicle. Deputies gave several commands for the suspect to exit his vehicle but he refused. Deputies then attempted to remove the suspect from his vehicle but he resisted being taken out of the vehicle. Deputies were able to remove him from the vehicle and took him to the ground at which time he refused to give deputies his hands. Eventually, Mcmahan was placed under arrest for resisting. Deputies attempted to get an account from McMahan of what occurred but he denied anything physical.

Deputies then made contact with the witness, who initially told officers she had observed the suspect push the victim into a table. She then changed her story and stated she did not observe the suspect put hands on the victim, only that she observed the victim fall backward onto the table.

Based on the statements from all parties McMahan was arrested for domestic assault and resisting arrest.

Officer T. LaForce LCPD, while working at the Lenoir City Middle School was radioed by the staff to make contact with the cafeteria manager who advised that one of the males working on the school property was in the cafeteria storage room, stealing packs of donuts and stuffing them into his hoodie pockets. The officer did make contact with the male subject, Joshua Leo Beck. Mr. Beck was walking down the hallway, and the officer asked him to step into the teachers' workroom. The officer asked Mr. Beck if he had taken donuts from the storage room and he did advise he did, I pack had already been opened, and 2 packs were in his backpack. The complainant stated he had taken 4

individual packs of donuts; the donuts are priced at \$1.00 a pack. During the theft investigation, the officer was searching for Mr. Beck's belongings when he attempted to conceal a metal pill container, the officer asked Mr. Beck what that was, and he advised an empty container, the officer asked him if he could open it and he did, which a white powdery substance fell on the ground. Mr. Beck informed the officer that it was meth, and he had forgotten about it.

The officer placed Beck in custody at that time. Officer R. Miller assisted with the investigation and gathered the meth off the ground with a piece of duct tape to collect all the products. The approximate weight of the white crystal-like product is less than half a gram. Mr. Beck was transported to the Loudon County Jail.

This did occur in Lenoir City, Loudon County TN.






