

to a camper that sits on this property, for a domestic disturbance. Upon arrival, a male. later identified as Mr. William Nicholson, leaned out the window of the camper and began screaming at deputies and the victim who was outside, later

identified as his girlfriend/victim. Mr. Nicholson exited the camper and threatened the victim, saying he would hurt her if he went to jail. The deputy detained Mr. Nicholson at that time. Deputies made contact with the victim, who stated that she and Mr. Nicholson got into a verbal argument; Mr. Nicholson grabbed the victim around the throat and attempted to choke her after a dispute over \$4.00. Mr. Nicholson released the victim and threw her back into the children's playpen while the children were inside the residence. Gordon Narmore, 44, Morton Lane Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault, and Interference with 911 Emergency.

Deputy B. McCall LCSO, responded to a domestic disturbance at Morton Lane. Upon arrival, the deputy observed the offender, Gordon Narmore, entering the front of the residence from the porch. The victim, was seated at a patio table on the front porch. The deputy could hear Mr. Narmore yelling inside the home. The deputy entered through the front door and instructed Mr. Narmore to step outside. The deputy then asked him what had occurred.

Mr. Narmore stated that he, his girlfriend, and their child live at this address with his girlfriend grandmother. He explained that he had been working on the grandmother truck when she came out and started arguing with him. He further explained that he became angry and broke some items on the porch that he had purchased. The deputy observed a fresh cut on Mr. Narmore's right hand, but he could not explain how the injury occurred. The vic-

At that moment, she said Mr. Narmore became irate, threw a rocking chair into the bookcase, breaking the glass, and then went out onto the front porch. Once on the porch, he continued to throw and break items. The victim attempted to call 911, but Mr. Narmore took her phone, threw it, and threatened to burn her house down. She also told deputies that Mr. Narmore pushed her, and in response, she pushed him away.

The witness provided a statement consistent with the victim account, but added that when Mr. Narmore threw the victim phone, she left the residence to call for help and wait for the police. Based on the facts stated above, The deputy took him into custody.
