



Thomas Murr, 61, Homeless Loudon, was charged with DUI, Driving on Roadways Laned with Traffic, and Evading Arrest.

Officer Sparks LCPD, while conducting routine patrol, observed a white Ford Fusion traveling in the wrong direction of travel. The vehicle was traveling South in the Northbound lane of travel approaching the intersection of Hwy 321 N / Town Creek Parkway. Officer initiated a traffic stop of that vehicle which stopped in the parking lot of Chili's - Fort Loudoun Medical Center Drive. Upon making contact with the driver of the vehicle, later identified as Thomas Ray Murr, officer observed that his eyes were bloodshot and glossy, and he presented



During the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus portion of the SFSTs, Officer observed the Lack of Smooth Pursuit. Distinct and Sustained Nystagmus at Maximum Deviation, and the Onset of Nystagmus Prior to 45 Degrees in both eyes. Mr. Murr stated he was unable to perform the other portions of the testing due to an issue with his knee. Mr. Murr advised he had consumed a "couple of Bud Light's" approximately 6 hours before the interaction. Mr. Murr was unable to provide a list of his prescription medication, but advised that they were prescribed for neuropathy, gout and heart conditions. Mr. Murr was advised to

have a seat in his vehicle for a brief moment. Officer returned to his vehicle in order to request a warrant and status check of Mr. Murr through dispatch. While in his vehicle, Mr. Murr closed the door to his vehicle and fled from the stop. The officer initiated his siren, along with his emergency lights that were already activated, and followed Mr. Murr in his vehicle. After fleeing from the stop, Mr. Murr traveled at low speeds through the

parking lot of Chili's, made a few turns through the lot and finally came to a stop still within the parking lot. Officer placed Mr. Murr into custody once out of the vehicle.

He was transported to the Fort Loudoun Medical Center for a blood draw, to which he consented to after being read the Tennessee Implied Consent Agreement. This incident did take place within Loudon County, Tennessee

"Our primary focus is to prevent acts of terrorism, mass casualty incidents, and any significant criminal or transnational criminal activity," said Cary Underwood, fusion center director. "We have numerous federal, state, and local agencies all working together toward that common goal."

When you walk into the fusion center, it can feel like you're in a scene from a movie.

The lights are often down, and a wall of screens is clued in to everything from traffic cameras to the local weather report. For the foreseeable future, several screens will be dedicated to many angles of Allegiant Stadium, site of Super Bowl LVIII

Las Vegas is a city that never slows down or turns off. Personnel from the Las Vegas police and fire departments, FBI, DHS, TSA, FAA, Homeland Security, and the National Weather Service, among oth-

ers, operate this fusion center 24/7. All parties are focused on keeping attendees safe at the Super Bowl.

Planning for the Super Bowl "started over a year ago," said Assistant Special Agent in Charge Jeremy Schwartz of FBI Las Vegas. The FBI provides bomb technicians, WMD experts, additional agents, and other operational resources to the city during the Super Bowl.

But what is most vauable, says Schwartz, is "having a full-time footprint at the fusion center in the Valley."

Adam Seely, section lieutenant, Southern Nevada Counterterrorism Center, adds, "Having the FBI as part of the Southern Nevada Counterterrorism Center has helped us greatly. It's enhanced our communications with our FBI partners, and we're able to jointly work investigations with them. It's a great working relationship ... and it's critical, especially, that we work with the fusion center to protect the city."




