which was not permitted. The defendant started to approach E.H. When E.H. received a second dinner tray, defendant knocked the tray from E.H.'s hands, sending food into the air and onto the ground. The defendant grabbed E.H. by the wrist to take control of him. The defendant then wrapped his arms around E.H.'s waist and hip-slammed E.H. headfirst into the concrete floor, fracturing E.H.'s skull and rendering E.H. momentarily unconscious.


Obituaries




