



#### Trespasser

Samuel McNabb. Browder Hollow Road Lenoir City, was charged with Criminal Trespass, and Public Intoxication.

Officer Parmer LCPD, was dispatched to W Broadway in reference to a prowler complaint. The complainant/ victim, advised central dispatch that an unknown male had come onto her porch, without the consent of the owner, and sat down. After sitting for a couple minutes, the male looked above him and observed a security camera. Upon observation of the security camera, the male stood up and took the cam-

era. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the victim, confirmed that the security camera had been taken, and watched the video that the camera recorded of the incident. After watching the video, the officer was able to get a description of the male and advised other LCPD units to be on the lookout. While in the area, Officer Robinson located a male, later identified as 63-year-old Samuel McNabb, matching the description he had given, behind Hi-Tech Auto Body, W Broadway. The victim advised the officer that she did not wish to pursue charges on Mr. McNabb, she just wanted

Jackie Jones, 65, Grove Street Loudon, was charged with Simple Possession x3, and Poss. of Drug Para.

Tobias Tuck, 46, Riverview Road Loudon, was charged with Simple Possession x2, and Child Support Attachment.

According to the report, Deputy Allen LCSO, arrived at Wade Road West for the report of a suspicious vehicle. As the deputy pulled up the driveway, he found two white males, one seated in the passenger seat of a Nissan Titan, and the other getting in the driver's seat. Both men began moving around rapidly in the vehicle. The deputy commanded both parties to show him their hands and stay still. The deputy approached and explained why he was there. The deputy identified the passenger as Jackie Jones and the individual on the driver's side as Tobias Tuck.

Mr. Jones stated he was at this address to visit his cousin. Mr. Tuck stated he had come to see the neighbor who had borrowed his sander. They both stated the truck had run out of gas and they were waiting for a ride.

Upon my finding that both parties had a revoked license, they stated an unknown third person who had left had driven them to this address. During the deputy interactions with Mr. Jones, he not-

ed he did have constricted pupils, slurred or slow speech, and trouble maintaining his balance, leading him to believe that he was under the influence of a drug or intoxicant. Mr. Tuck was found to have an attachment and was placed in custody. Mr. Jones admits the Nissan Titan is his and agreed to allow a search seemed to be very concerned with a case of sprite.

The deputy looked into the open box and saw a purple and silver pill container. Upon opening the container, the deputy found one green-color round pill consistent with Hydrocodone and one orange-color pill that appears to have been broken into quarters consistent with Suboxone. Mr. Jones stated he did not know these pills. Upon searching the truck an elastic tourniquet and a capped ICC syringe were found. Mr. Jones was taken into custody at this time. While searching Mr. Jones a Marijuana cigarette was found in his pants pocket.

As Mr. Tuck was searched one half of a green pill consistent with Hydrocodone and one blue oval pill consistent with Alprazolam were found in his pocket.

Both men were transported to the Loudon County Jail. The syringe was photographed and properly disposed of in an appropriate sharps container.

#### WATER SYSTEM FLUSHING PROGRAM

The Lenoir City Utilities Board (LCUB) and Lenoir City Fire Department will be conducting our semi-annual water distribution system wide flushing program per Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation Water Quality Control Requirements. The Flushing Program will occur for LCUB customers on Sunday, April 14, 2024, from 6:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. thru Saturday, April 20, 2024, until 3:00 p.m. The program goals are to identify problems in the water system and ultimately have them corrected. When fire hydrants are flowed, iron deposits in the water lines become agitated. This may cause a brown discoloration to the water in the area which is being flushed. This condition is only temporary and will normally correct itself in a number of hours. During this period of flushing, LCUB recommends that you flow your cold water prior to use to determine if there is any discoloration. While the water is still safe for consumption, we recommend not laundering white clothes without first testing the water for discoloration. If your water is discolored, it will clear up on its own under normal usage over a period of time. It is also best to limit the use of your hot water until the water flows clear as this will keep the iron deposits from going into your water heater. You may also notice a drop in water pressure during these times; however, the water pressure should return to normal within a short period of time. If you continue to experience difficulty with your water pressure or continue to have discoloration of water on Monday, April 29, 2024, please contact LCUB at 1-844-OUR-LCUB (687-5282) to report the problem.

William Clinton, 35, Bon Street Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.


Officers were dispatched to J. Espinoza LCPD located a US Highway 321 North regarding an unconscious male sitting in the driver seat of a gray Honda Accord. Upon arrival, the officer contacted the vehicle matching the description of the complainant. When approaching the vehicle's driver side door, the officer observed William Andrew Clinton, unconscious in the driver seat of said vehicle. After observing the keys in the ignition and Clinton sleeping at the wheel. The officer woke Clinton, ordered him to turn off, and step outside the vehicle. During the investigation,

Clinton advised, he consumed Heroin approximately two or three hours prior to our interaction. Thus, he willingly agreed to perform a series of SFST's. The following are Clintons clues of impairment: Lack of smooth pursuit, Distinct and Sustained Nystagmus @ maximum deviation from both eyes during the HGN. He stopped while walking, stepped off the line x2, used arms for balance, and

counted the wrong number of steps during the walk & turn. Clinton swayed while balancing and put his foot down during the One Leg Stand test. Consequently, William Andrew Clinton was placed under arrest for driving under the influence. Officers on scene read the TN Blood and/or Breath Consent Advisement to Clinton. However, he refused to provide a blood sample for chemical testing.

"We have to address these health-related social needs to help women get the mammograms they need," said CDC Chief Medical Officer Debra Houry, M.D., M.P.H. "Identifying these challenges and coordinating efforts between health care, social services, organizations. community and public health to help address these needs could improve efforts to increase breast cancer screening and ultimately save these tragic losses to families.'

While the cost of accessing health care was the greatest challenge for women who did not get a mammogram in the past two years, other major barriers include: being dissatisfied with life, feeling socially isolated, experiencing lost or reduced hours at work, and not having reliable transportation.

Women without health in-

surance, who have low incomes, and who do not have a usual source of health care are also less likely to get mammograms.

"If we are to achieve higher breast cancer screening for all women, we have to look at all the possible challenges women face in getting mammograms," said Lisa C. Richardson, M.D., M.P.H., director, CDC's Division of Cancer Prevention and Control. "Health care providers can now assess whether women have health-related social needs and help women get the services they need. Every woman should be able to get screened for breast cancer without barriers."

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force currently recommends that women ages 50-74 get a screening mammogram every two years and that women ages 40-49 talk to their health care providers about when to start

and how often to get a mammogram.


Funded by CDC's National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program, access to free or low-cost breast and cervical cancer screening services is available to people with low incomes who do not have insurance through state,

tribe, and territory health departments. Mammograms are available at no cost through most private health insurance plans and Medicare.




