Unemployment Rates Drop in Every County Across Tennessee

All 95 Counties Experienced Lower Unemployment in April 2024

April 2024 Top 10 Lowest and Highest County Unemployment Rates in Tennessee

Fach of Tennessee's 95 counties recorded lower unemployment rates in April, and each came in at or below 4.1%, according to newly released data from the Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDL- WD).

Williamson County recorded the state's lowest unemployment rate for the month. At 2%, the rate dropped 0.2 of a percentage point from 2.2% in March.

Sevier County had Tennessee's second-lowest rate April, which was 2.1%, down 0.4 of a percentage point from the previous month's rate.

CDC warns of Salmonella outbreaks linked to backyard poultry flocks

A CDC investigation notice regarding outbreaks of Salmonella infections has been posted: https:// www.cdc.gov/salmonella/backyardpoultry-05-24/index.html

Key Points:

109 people from 29 states have gotten sick from Salmonella after touching or caring for backyard poultry. 33 people have been hospitalized and no deaths have been reported.

In this outbreak, 43% of the people infected with Salmonella are under 5 years old.

poultry Do: Backyard carry Salmonella germs even if they look healthy and clean. These germs can easily spread to anything in the areas where the poultry live and roam.

You can get sick from touching your backyard poultry or anything in their environment and



perienced the state's highest rates of unemployment, they still decreased and were below 5%. Both counties recorded rates of 4.1%, which was a 0.4 of a percentage point drop for Clay County. Lauderdale County's rate went down 0.4 of a percentage point in April.

Bledsoe County had the second-highest jobless rate at 3.9%, which was 0.3 of a percentage point lower than the rate it recorded in March.

A complete analysis of the unemployment data for each county, along with data for Tennessee's cities and metropolitan and micropolitan areas, is available here.

County unemployment rates are not adjusted to take into consideration seasonal impacts on employment such as school breaks, severe weather events, and jobs during the holiday season.

One week ago, TDLWD reported that the statewide seasonally adjusted unemployment rate had dropped 0.1 of a percentage point to match Tennessee's all-time low unemployment rate of 3.1%.

School is out for the year across Tennessee. Young adults ages 14-24 still have time to take part in YEP, Tennessee's Youth Employment Program. YEP matches participants with employers who can mentor them through





Handle eggs safely.

Call you healthcare provider right away if you are experiencing any severe symptoms of Salmonella.

What Stores Selling Backyard Poultry Should Do:

Source poultry from hatcheries that take steps to reduce Salmonella

Clean and sanitize poultry display areas between shipments of new poultry.

This informational poster describes ways to stay healthy with backyard flocks. Place it right beside flock display areas, and hand it out to customers.

What Backvard Poultry Hatcheries Should Do:

best management practices to help prevent Salmonella in poultry.

Participate in the voluntary USDA-NPIP U.S. Salmonella Monitored Program and certify that your flocks are monitored for Salmonella germs.

Provide health information to owners and potential buyers of poultry before purchase.

Salmonella Symptoms:

Most people infected with Salmonella experience diarrhea, fever, and stomach

Symptoms usually start 6 hours to 6 days after swallowing the bacteria.

Most people recover without treatment after 4 to 7 days.




