turn a Revolutionary War-era musket to the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia on July 1, 2024—more than 50 years after it was stolen from Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

The .78-caliber firearm was stolen

Juan Almanza, 36, Church Drive Drive Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Assault.

Officer Sparks LCPD, was dispatched to Crisp Road in reference to an armed subject. Upon arrival, Officer Sparks met with the complainant and victim, who stated that a male had approached him in front of the listed residence while holding a baseball bat and threatened to hit him with it. The victim was going door-to-door in the area selling pest control and was speaking with the resident of Crisp Road, when a hispanic male wearing a black t-shirt and gray shorts approached them both holding a black and red baseball bat over his shoulder. The resident/

victim identified the male as being Juan Almanza and stated that he lived at the end of Crisp Road. Both victims stated that Juan was yelling at victim 1 about knowing him "from the ring" and that he wanted him to leave the area. Juan became more aggressive and held the bat in the air as if he intended to hit victim 1 with it. Victim 1 stated that because Juan was holding the bat in the air and speaking in a way that "wasn't making a whole lot of sense", he felt that Juan would have harmed him had he not moved away. After Juan lifted the baseball bat in the air, victim 1 ran to the front porch of the residence where victim 2 was standing. Juan continued yelling at Ryan for a few moments and then ran into the

woods after dropping the bat on the ground near the roadway. Both victims provided written statements of the events that occurred. Camera footage of the incident was provided by another resident of the listed address, and the camera that recorded the events was positioned on the front of the residence facing the roadway and driveway. Victim 1 also stated that he had offered to sell Juan Almanza pest control a few minutes prior to this incident but left his residence when Juan stated he was not

interested. Victim 1 stated he had never met Juan Almanza prior to this. No contact was made with Juan Almanza at the time the report was taken, and he was not located at his residence, Church Drive. The bat used in this incident was located near the road off of Crisp Road and was logged into evidence. This incident did take place within Loudon County, TN. Video gathered from the witness was uploaded to Axon. In the video the incident begins around the 2:00 minute mark and ends around the 3:30 minute mark

Christie Cox, 48, Highway 72 Loudon, was charged Domestic Assault.

Deputy Watson LCSO, responded to Highway 72 in reference to a physical domestic. Upon arrival, Deputy Watson made contact with (Complainant/victim) in the driveway of the residence. Deputy Watson observed the victim to have scratches on his stomach consistent with an assault. The victim stated that his girlfriend, Christie Cox (Offender/Arrestee) became upset and started attacking him because their friend got arrested. Ms. Cox slapped the glasses off the victim and then kicked a window out of a exterior door at their residence. The victim stated that Ms. Cox was inside the residence in the bed. Deputies made contact with Ms. Cox laying on a couch inside the residence.

Ms. Cox was extremely intoxicated and was taken into custody for domestic assault. Ms. Cox became resistive while escorting her out of the residence and to his vehicle. Ms. Cox had a small cut from a glass door she had put her foot through. Cpl. Wallen wrapped the foot up and she was secured in his patrol vehicle. The victim asked if he could write his domestic statement for him due to his bad spelling and it was completed with his signature. The victim was given his domestic rights paperwork on scene. While in route to the jail, Ms. Cox started hitting her head on my steel divider in my patrol vehicle. Deputies pulled over and secured Ms. Cox by seatbelt.

No injuries were observed on Ms. Cox from the steel divider. Ms. Cox was transported the rest of the way to the jail without incident. This did occur in Loudon County, TN.



Robert Taylor, 55, Wellingham Drive Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault, and Resisting Arrest.

Officer A. Lee LCPD, was dispatched to the area of Lakeway Urgent Care in reference to a male subject with a mental status change. Dispatch advised the male, Robert Taylor, had made threats against the family but was unarmed. Upon arrival Officer Lee was waived down by the complainant. Officer Lee then observed Robert Taylor approach the complainant in an aggressive manner and appeared to be screaming at him. As Officer Lee got out of his patrol car Robert turned towards his sister, the victim, and grabbed at her while screaming. Victim grabbed Roberts arms to keep him from grabbing her. Robert let go but continued acting belligerent. Robert then started to

grab at the victim again and that is when Officer Lee intervened by verbally getting Roberts attention. For everyone's safety, Officer Lee attempted to detain Robert and place him into restraints so that the scene would be safe for officers to further investigate the incident and work towards resolving the issue. However, Robert refused to comply by tensing his arms and pulling away then stated "I'm gonna kill you". Other officers responded and assisted me in taking Robert into custody. Robert never became compliant throughout the entirety of the incident and made multiple threats against me stating he would kill and/or murder me. Both hand restraints and leg restraints were checked for proper fit and double locked. Robert was transported to the jail where he became belligerent with correctional staff. After meeting with inves-UMTPD Detective Bren- tigators, the collector-who didn't know the musket was stolen and wasn't connected to the heist-willingly turned over the musket to the FBI Art Crime Team.


